WI News

At our May meeting we welcomed Jeremy Thickitt, master butcher, and his assistant Rachel Thompson from Clarke's Butchers. Two tables had been set up, Jeremy arrived with his cutting board, saw, knives and a whole lamb carcass. He told us that the lamb was 6 months old, a Southdown which is a rare breed going back to 1800, smaller than some breeds and with more fat. The carcass had been hung for 8 days. He then started to demonstrate his butchery skills starting at the neck for the scrag end and then the whole shoulder with its ribs. The rib cage was taken off and the breast removed, the breast once a cheap cut is now valuable as lamb belly to restaurants. The fillet and kidneys were removed. The ribs, one end for chops and with the best end he showed us how it is transformed into a "rack of lamb" by removing much of the fat and scraping the bones. At this stage some of the prepared lamb was taken by Rachel into the kitchen to be cooked and the sauteed samples were passed around to us.... delicious! As he did his work, Jeremy

told us about his background. His father bought a butchers in Peasenhall, Jeremy's 2 older brothers were not keen so Jeremy, leaving school at 15 with encouragement from his father (you have got to use your hands, boy) tried butchery. He loved it. In 1982 the abattoir in Bramfield was acquired by the family and was in use until 1990 when new government regulations made it too costly to run but the butchery side thrived and expanded. The opportunity to buy Emmerdale Farm, Darsham then came up (his wife was keen to move out of Bramfield) where Jeremy now breeds cattle, and the Farm Shop sells all meats and groceries.

He ended his cutting with the leg. The shank was removed, and the rest was deboned to give a rump and the leg was rolled and tied up, ready for the oven. We were enthralled with this transformation of the carcass into recognizable cuts of lamb. We did not hesitate to come forward when told that we could now purchase the result of Jeremy's butchering skills. We quickly bought everything on offer. If there had been time for a second carcass, that would have gone as well! We thanked Jeremy and Rachel for a very entertaining and educational hour.

June Nature Notes

When we look out at the countryside in summer it is easy to overlook the fact that our landscape is dominated by one family of plants, the grasses. Whether this is the cereal crop growing in arable fields, animal grazed pastures, roadside verges or even our own lawns, grasses predominate. Grasses are probably the most diverse group of plants varying enormously in size, growth habit and appearance. They are found in virtually all habitats, from the large clump-forming cocksfoot of rough meadows to fine fescues of chalk downland and from the two-metre-tall reed sweetgrass growing in freshwater marshes to marram grass on sand dunes.







Grasses belong to the Poaceae family but are closely related to rushes and sedges. Rushes however, have small, brown flowers occurring in clusters, and sedges, although having flowers similar to grasses, have a solid triangular stem, unlike the grass stem which is round and hollow with swollen joints. Grass flowers, whilst green and inconspicuous, produce pollen and seeds like any other flowering plant. Grasses are wind-pollinated plants so they do not have brightly coloured or scented flowers to attract insects. Their pollen is carried by the wind to other plants of the same species, allowing fertilisation to occur. Most flower in June and July, although it is possible to find some in flower all year round.

Grasses are very successful as plants, largely because they grow continuously from the base, and can withstand losing the top shoots. This means that they are not killed by grazing and mowing - hence lawns are made of grass. Most grasslands do in fact have to be artificially managed to maintain them - without mowing or grazing grasslands would return to scrub and eventually to woodland. Agricultural grasslands historically fall into two categories. Those used for grazing animals were termed pastures, and those cut for hay were known as meadows. Meadows are more species-rich than pasture, and were often sited on land liable to be flooded. Today most grasslands are much less diverse than they used to be because the mixture of grasses and other flowering plants has been replaced by monocultures of high-yielding grasses such as ryegrass for grazing animals and silage making. In Suffolk 165 species of grass have been recorded, of which 73 are non-native.

As well as providing the main source of food for domestic cattle, sheep and horses, grasses are hugely important for wildlife. Mammals such as rabbits and hares feed directly on grass, while clumps of grass provide shelter hedgehogs and for small mammals which in turn are hunted by birds of prey. Similarly, though, many species of invertebrate feed directly on grasses - they are the sole food-plant of grasshoppers and of brown butterflies such as skippers, meadow brown and ringlet, very many more rely on grassland for shelter and refuge, to find and capture prey, build nests and find mates.

Cancer Support Group (Peer Relief)

For many people, and their families, getting a cancer diagnosis can be terrifying. In reality, for some people, this can be very serious news, with no easy outcome. But for so many people these days the diagnosis is not nearly as bad as it was a few years ago. Earlier diagnostic techniques and better treatments mean that people with cancer now often live far longer, often many years. Many more people go into full remission and recover completely.

Even so it can be a difficult journey for families and friends. To this end a cancer support group has been set up to help everyone concerned. The group is made up of people with cancer, those looking after them, cancer survivors, a retired GP, and others with a background related to cancer. There are no formal lectures or talks. Instead members meet informally in a very friendly, supportive and positive manner to share tips and practical ways to help people cope with treatments, diets, daily life etc. It is hoped to have the occasional social event for members . The group members are also able to give practical help where needed, like giving lifts to hospital or getting shopping.

One way the group can help is with financial assistance. Money is available for people with cancer (and other long-term illnesses) so we have asked Caroline Goldsmith to chat to the group about what

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

2. Briefings from Guest Speakers

- a) Coastal Accessible Transport Service - Lynn Butler, Office Manager, briefed the Council about the Connected Communities bus service which is available to rural parishes for walking, shopping and visiting. Walks can be non-circular and well-behaved dogs are welcome on board for no charge. The bus is demand led and can be booked online or by telephone. Charges are in line with public bus services but, unfortunately, bus passes cannot be used. Discounted fares are available for four or more passengers and return services are cheaper. The buses are wheelchair friendly and they help people to stay independent. An added benefit is they are staffed by regular drivers who get to know their passengers which provides an extra check on their welfare. The bus service covers an area from Orford to Walberswick. CATS also offer a door-to-door service whereby volunteers use their own cars to provide transport, mainly to medical appointments. More volunteers are needed to provide this valuable community service. Drivers are reimbursed 45p per mile and can choose where and how often they volunteer. CATS is funded by Suffolk County Council and donations from Town and Parish Councils. Their contract expires at the end of March 2023 and they hope the County Council will continue to support the service and enable them to expand by providing more buses. County Cllr. Richard Smith said he has worked with CATS for many years and they provide a good service. The contract will go out to tender and he hopes CATS will be successful.
- b) County Broadband Provider the Chairman explained that the speaker was unable to attend therefore the invitation was extended to the Council's June meeting. Cllr. Graham Lacey briefed the Council about the proposal to deliver superfast broadband to households by providing full fibre to premises. County Broadband propose to fund the cost of building the bespoke infrastructure but they need to ensure the new network is viable by having a minimum number of homes using it, therefore residents will need to pre-order the service before they start the build. At present, the existing fibre to cabinet network provides internet speeds between 25 and 50 mb and distance from the cabinet makes the connection slower. The copper wire is unreliable and ageing and will eventually need to be replaced by fibre optic cable. This will enable really fast speeds, both for uploads and downloads, and can add value to homes. The cheapest service offered by County Broadband will guarantee to increase the speed to 300 mb and up to 900 mb for the higher cost services. The monthly charge for 300 mb is £28 per month for the first six months rising to £48 per month thereafter. The Council agreed that it was not endorsing the service nor can it offer advice to residents. County Broadband are invited to publicise their product and to answer any questions.

It was agreed to add the Council's name to the response.

A protest march from Leiston to Sizewell beach will be held next Sunday where there will be talks by a number of speakers.

Parish Council Chairman's Report - May 2022

Parish Council vacancy

Following a resignation, we again have a vacancy on the Parish Council. If you would like to be considered for this position, please contact Sharon Smith. Anyone co-opted at this stage will serve until the election in May 2023.

Annual Parish Meeting (APM)

This was held in the Village Hall on May 10th and the draft minutes appear elsewhere in this Newsletter.

The Parish Council report to the APM looked back over the year and included the following matters.

Sizewell C

The potential impact of the Sizewell C project has taken up much of our time in Parish Council meetings and at times the debates have been somewhat heated. This is only to be expected given the prospect of construction traffic travelling through Middleton Moor in the early years and the simultaneous construction of the Sizewell Link Road (SLR) through open countryside in the south of the Parish.

A decision on approval of the Development Consent Order (DCO) is now expected from the Secretary of State on July 8th, 2022. If, as widely expected, the DCO is approved, the Parish Council plans to hold a public meeting in the Village Hall to debate the implications for our area.

Planning

The Parish Council is consulted on all planning applications for land and buildings in the Parish. Middleton cum Fordley is classified as a 'Small Village' in the Suffolk Coastal Local Plan which means that new housing will normally be restricted to 'Small groups of new housing and infill within Settlement Boundaries'. The only significant exception to this is the development by Hastoe Housing of affordable housing on what is now known as Roke Drive. This was supported by the Parish Council and we were pleased to welcome the new residents to the village.

The Parish Council ensures that all planning applications are considered at a duly convened meeting held in public. In the last financial year, we considered planning applications in respect of 10 properties. In each case we either recorded our support or made no objection.

Parish Finances

The Parish Council receives income mainly from Council Tax, the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) and other occasional grants. CIL is levied on all new housing developments and can only be used for improvements to local infrastructure.

At the end of March 2022, the Parish Council had general reserves of approximately £3,900. This is approximately 50% of the annual Council Tax received by the Council, which is in line with our financial planning guidelines. In the current year we expect to receive £8,270 from Council Tax (up 2%) and we have a budget to spend about £8,000 including £2,000 allocated for special projects one of which is to improve access to the green space on Title Road known as the Burial Ground.

Dear all,

For your information, we are planning to carry out drainage investigations and gully and ditch cleansing works along U2401 Fordley Road, Middleton (from B1122 junction to Littlemoor Road junction). The works are programmed to take place between 8 and 10 June 2022. The road will be closed each day between 9am and 3.30pm to ensure that we can carry out our works safely.

For the duration of the road closure, traffic will be diverted via B1122, Littlemoor Road and vice versa.

As we plan roadworks in advance, we schedule extra days to allow for bad weather or other delays beyond our control. If we need to make major changes to our work dates, we will update the information signs on site.


