

#### **August Nature Notes**

August is traditionally the month of the year associated with the harvest and the mammal often associated with the harvest is the harvest mouse. However, the association between cereals and harvest mice is not strong and undoubtedly they have become rarer in cereal fields because of increased mechanisation. Harvest mice still occasionally use standing crops of wheat but tend to have a positive aversion to barley, with their preferred habitat being wetter areas of rough grassland, tall fen and reed beds.

The harvest mouse is Britain's smallest rodent, (the scientific binomial *Micromys minutus* means tiny small mouse) averaging about six grammes when adult, about the same as a twennty pence coin; less than half the weight of a house mouse. In comparison to other British species of mice it has a blunt nose, large eyes, and large hairy ears and a semi-prehensile tail the same length of the head and body. The upper part of the body is brown, sometimes with a yellow or red tinge, and the under-parts range from white to cream coloured Its small size and semiprehensile tail means it is well adapted to a life of climbing in tall grasses. The mouse's rather broad feet are also adapted for



climbing, with a somewhat opposable, large outermost toe, allowing it to grip stems with each hindfoot and its tail, thus freeing the forepaws for food collection. Harvest mice exploit grass seed when it is most abundant in late summer, autumn and winter, but take a high proportion of their food in insects (such as flies, moths and grasshoppers) during spring and summer. They also will eat berries and fungi and even moss when other food is scarce.

Harvest mice do not start to breed until the vegetation has reached its full height and density i.e. from late May onwards until late autumn if the weather is suitable. Breeding nests are the most obvious sign indicating the presence of harvest mice. The harvest mouse is the only British mammal to build nests of woven grass – nests tend to be found in dense vegetation such as grasses, rushes, reeds, grassy hedgerows, and brambles. They are generally located at least 30cm above ground in short grasses and up to a metre in tall reeds. The size of the nest can vary from only 5cm in diameter for non-breeding nests to 10cm in diameter for breeding nests. Harvest mice have spectacular potential for population growth. Females become sexually mature at as little as 35 days old and they can have up to three litters per year, averaging five pups per litter. Such fecundity can lead to huge surges in the population; however, they are prone to high mortality rates during the winter, demonstrating a classic 'boom and bust' population dynamic. harvest mice are susceptible to food shortages, cold temperatures and predation by, cats, stoats, weasels, kestrels, owls, corvids and even pheasants, indeed by almost any predator that walks, runs or flies.

There have been several reports of bin fires in the county recently - discarded batteries account for around 50% of them. Please recycle batteries at appropriate places – most supermarkets have facilities.



#ShakeItOut is the latest recycling campaign from the Suffolk Waste Partnership which aims to reduce spoiled recycling. It encourages residents to dispose of their recycling without using a black sack or plastic bin bag and instead to shake out their recyclables into the recycling bin, ensuring everything is clean, dry and loose.

As it's impossible to know what's inside black sacks or bagged recycling, they are removed from collected recycling at the beginning of the sorting process, which means any recycled content will be wasted. Burst bags containing waste or recycling contaminated with food and drink can spoil other good recycling too.

#### Potholes, footpaths, litter & dog poo

Potholes, the bane of the road user and widely disruptive on the road network around Middleton, the surrounding area & the UK! Broken, missing or obscured Public Footpath signs perhaps fall into the same category for walkers. A member of the public at the last Parish Council meeting raised the question of how to alert Suffolk County Council so as to rectify these problems.

Reporting issues is simple and can be done by anyone with access to the Internet.

First find the website **Suffolk.gov.uk** then using the SEARCH field type one of the following: **Reporting** Potholes / Reporting a Public Right of Way issue.

Then follow the instructions - 'Simples'!



It's a pity, but during the late spring and early summer, litter seems to be on the increase on our village footpaths. For such a beautiful area quite why discarding litter seems acceptable to some people is a mystery. Dog poo also seems to increase on our footpaths during the summer months. I recall back in 2015 a

Leiston resident came up with a campaign to hide in the undergrowth and photograph dog owners who did not clear up after their pets. Having been given the thumbs up by actor Hugh Grant the local constabulary were less than enthusiastic. What came of it I've no idea. I would have thought there must be simpler ways of asking dog owners to take responsibility, perhaps encouraging holiday let companies to provide those little biodegradable bags could

be a step in the right direction?

#### MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 11th JULY 2023 AT 7pm AT THE VILLAGE HALL

1 Attendance and Apologies Attendees: Cllr Julian Cusack – Chair Cllr Steve Thorpe Cllr Graham Lacey Cllr Chris Reynolds

#### 2 Councillors' Declarations of Interest. None.

#### 3 Public Forum

Cllr Lesley Taylor Cllr Charles Macdowell

a) A resident from the Village Green Group thanked the Parish Council for the opportunity to enhance the village green, along with two residents of Minsmere Rise for their assistance. The Open Gardens Committee were also thanked for the £200 donation, which will be spent on a new bench. It was also reported that there is a need for new signs to read Do Not Park on the Green. It was agreed that three signs are required, and Cllr Cusack suggested Leiston Press for the purchase thereof. Cllr Cusack also confirmed that a financial contribution was offered to the Village Green Group by the Parish Council, evidenced in the minutes at the time of the request, and that this offer still stands, subject to submission of a plan for how the money would be used.

Cllr Cusack raised the issue of the two refurbished ploughs and their location within the village. This was originally proposed to be in the Recreation Ground car park area; however, it has also been suggested that consideration be given to the ploughs being placed on the Green and it was reported that the Village Green Group are happy with this suggestion and felt that the ploughs would be a good addition. Thus, placement of the ploughs on the Green was supported by the Parish Council, subject to agreement from the residents that surround the area. Cllr Thorpe offered to be the point of

contact between the Village Green Group and the Parish Council.

It was reported that The Summer Wine Group had kindly agreed to absorb the cost of creating an appropriate base for the ploughs and ensure that they are safely and securely fixed in place and all sharp edges removed.

A second member of the public addressed the Council regarding the recent road traffic accidents on the B1122, and whether it would be possible to install speed cameras. This was followed by a request to replace three missing road signs. Cllr Thorpe advised that members of the public can access the Suffolk County Council Highways Department portal to report issues such as missing signs. It was also suggested that photos be taken. Again, it was confirmed that the Highways Department are responsible for overgrown vegetation on verges and the removal thereof, which too can be reported through the portal.

The Councillors were advised that a resident has offered to purchase and supply a defibrillator for the village hall.

An enquiry was made about the zip wire on the Recreation Ground and Cllr Cusack advised that it is to be dismantled due to rotten timbers. The decision on whether to replace like for like or purchase something completely different has not been made (the cost for a new zip wire would be over £10,000). Upon request, Cllr Cusack to enquire how long it takes to carry out the monthly playground inspections. [Subsequent to the meeting it was ascertained that the monthly operational inspections take between 30 and 45 minutes.]

- b) County Councillor report. None.
- c) District Councillor report. None.

#### 4 Minutes

a) The Council approved the minutes of the Annual Parish Council meeting on 13<sup>th</sup> June 2023 as accurate.

#### b) Matters arising

The large banner sign on the Village Green outside Norwood House has been removed, although other smaller signs remain.

Cllrs Thorpe and Macdowell have submitted their Declarations of Interest. Cllr Lacey has made contact with Richard Turner (village hall), as the PC contact. Cllr Thorpe is making progress with contacting holiday let companies/dog fouling and discussions with local farmers regarding footpaths.

Cllr Lacy made enquiries about the option of a longer reach machine to clear the pond at Middleton Moor. This is not a cost-effective option. Cllr Cusack thanked Cllr Lacey for following up.

Parish Council support for planning application DC/23/2037/FUL (The Yews, Back Road) has been entered on the Planning Portal.

#### 5 Councillors' Reports

- a) Village Hall. Next meeting will be in September.
- b) Middleton Primary School. Nothing to report.
- c) Energy Project, including Sizewell C. See below.
- d) Highways, footpath and trees. Cllr Reynolds advised that pulling out of Title Road has become dangerous due to overgrown vegetation. Action: Cllr Thorpe to report on Highways Portal.
- e) Middleton Moor. See above.

#### 6 Finance

- a) The latest financial position was received and accepted by all.
- b) Authorisation was given for the payment of £35 to the Information Commissioner's Office.

#### 7 B1122/B1125 Sizewell C Early Years Joint Parishes Meeting

Cllr Macdowell reported on the joint parishes meeting that took place on Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> June. The purpose of the meeting was to refine the draft letter. The contents of the letter were briefly discussed and furnished to all Councillors. The letter will be sent tomorrow (Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> July) along with an email referencing the recent road traffic accidents, mentioned above. Later that day the letter will be issued to the local media, with Cllr Cusack as contact.

In other Sizewell news an application for Judicial Review has been turned down and is now being appealed, funded by TASK and Stop Sizewell C.

Cllr Cusack has replied to issues raised by a resident regarding the Middleton Green Group.

#### 9 Items for the Next Agenda. None.

#### 10 Next Meeting

Cllr Cusack asked the councillors for their thoughts on a longer strategy review for village improvements/projects and whether this was a good idea, which was agreed. Action: Clerk to email Councillors requesting availability during August.

meeting closed at 8pm.

(Trust account stands at just under £20,000 following this payment). A resident reported to Cllr Taylor that a stopcock had been left dangerously exposed on the recreation ground. Cllr Reynolds advised that the manhole cover has been replaced.

Cllr Taylor informed the meeting of correspondence received from a resident regarding several matters relating to the Recreation Ground. It was agreed to provide a thorough response, addressing all points raised in the letter. A member of the public said he was aware of the letter and urged the Council to take due note of its contents.

Action: Cllrs Cusack and Taylor to draft the response letter and furnish to Councillors. Cllr Reynolds suggested that the Trust create a long-term plan for replacement equipment and the idea of a meeting in August was discussed (see PC minutes). Cllr Cusack thanked Cllr Taylor for significantly helping to improve the service of the Pavilion. Action – Clerk to circulate a copy of the received letter to all councillors and send the response to the resident after circulation to the Councillors for comment.

The offer of a gift garden furniture was raised. Action Cllr Reynolds to investigate and report back.

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
