Sizewell C update

The expected 30mph limit on the B1122 from Yoxford to Leiston will be implemented at the end of May alongside 20mph through Theberton. Meanwhile we are continuing to lobby Sizewell C and the County and District councils for 20mph through Middleton Moor: It is being considered seriously; anyone wanting to support this should write to our County Councillor Richard Smith richard.smith@suffolk.gov.uk who will be instrumental in the final decision. A speed enforcement plan to support these new limits will be presented at the Northern Transport Forum on 8 May. Thanks to pressure from us and other Parish Councils, Sizewell C vehicle marking using rear blue stickers and plates has started on their 4x4 fleet and will continue on HGVs into next month. Worker numbers are currently around 500 growing to 1,500 by the end of the year (and 6,000+ eventually). Sizewell Beach's footpath in front of the SZC site will be closed and diverted in late August for the construction of sea defences. I have asked for the future dates of the full closure of the beach Please continue to send your complaints about Sizewell C to info@sizewellc.com or call 0800 197 6102 with as much detail as you can, including number plates and company names. Photos are even better.


CAN YOU HELP HOSTING MUSICIANS?

Middleton Dark Skies

May Highlights

<u>Planets on View</u> Early risers (very), will get a chance to see both Saturn and Mars out towards the east before dawn. As they rise at around 3 and 4am respectively, they may become quickly lost in the dawn glow.

<u>Constellations</u> With the night's drawing out more and more, observing the dark evening sky is getting later as the weeks push on towards the summer. One constellation worth trying to spot is Bootes (the Herdsman), which contains Arcturus, the brightest star visible during May. (4th brightest of all stars). The constellation is shaped rather like an old-fashioned kite and once dark enough can be seen high up in the southern sky. Arcturus is a red giant star, so should appear to have a reddish hue.

Meteor Showers Again, another one for the early risers, the Eta Aquariids meteor shower will be visible out towards the east, and peaking in the pre-dawn sky of the 6th. These meteors are associated with Halley's Comet, and are small particles of ice and dust left in the comets wake over several millennia. No moon of any note this year, so a fair chance of spotting a few of the 50 or so an hour that are expected.


Comets No known comets visible this month.

<u>The Moon</u> Full moon occurs on the 23rd of the month, its name is the Flower Moon. Other names are Hare, Milk and Corn Planting Moon. On the 12th the moon will be sitting next to Castor and Pollux in the constellation of Gemini, out towards the western horizon.

Artificial Satellites While you are looking up at the night sky, its almost certain that you will notice moving dots of light passing overhead. If you stay out for a while, then these are likely to run into a couple of dozen or more sightings. If they don't blink, then these are almost certainly artificial satellites. (if it blinks it's a plane!) Generally, the satellites move from west to east, with the rotation of the earth. When a satellite is launched, the earth's rotation gives the launch vehicle a helping hand, which saves on fuel and increases its speed. A satellite moving South to North or vice versa, is very likely to be a weather or military satellite. With this orbit the earth rotates below the satellite so that it passes over a different area of the earth on each orbit. Some satellites in these orbits can observe the whole of the earth in 24hrs. If you happen upon several quite small dots of lights following each other across the sky (anything up to 20 or so, then these will be part of the Starlink satellite internet service. There are over 5500 of these satellites already in orbit, out of a planned 12,000!! 42,000 if further extensions of the system go ahead. One satellite that you can make plans to see and will not need any time for your eyes to adjust to, is the International Space Station (ISS). Dates and times, length of time on view etc, are readily available on the internet or via an app, and is worth a look. A couple of evenings to check out in May are as follows: -

Fri 10th Visible 2229-2233, low in the south. Moving from SW-SE Saturday 11th Visible 2140-2145, low in the south. Moving S-E Saturday 11th Visible 2315-2321, high towards the south. Moving overhead from W-E.

May Nature Notes

Queen bumblebees are one of the first insects we are likely to see in the spring, sometimes as early as February if the weather is kind. Though, by May we start to see greater numbers and species of bumblebees in our gardens. Those with an interest in natural history can immediately recognise several different forms and can probably hazard a name at some. They are furry enough to appear 'cute' rather than dangerous, like the social wasps, and are therefore viewed with affection rather than fear. They also rather attractive, usually black with a pattern of yellow or grey bands and a 'tail' that ranges from white to deep red, others have a chestnut body and lack a coloured tail.

In early spring when the queen bumblebee emerges from hibernation she is looking to replenish the body fats that were lost during hibernation with pollen and nectar. She will forage heavily from spring flowering shrubs and plants, such as dandelions and dead nettles. The queen will then seek out nest sites to start the new colony; these are in warm, well-insulated places, typically in old mouse or vole nests. A few species will use nest boxes and holes in trees. In the nest, the queen makes a pot from secreted wax, which she fills with nectar, to sustain her when she attends her first brood. She also collects pollen to form a pollen lump, on this, she lays her eggs; this will feed the growing larvae until, after going through several moults, they produce a cocoon into which they pupate. After a few weeks, the first workers emerge; it is the job of these first workers to maintain the nest and to forage for nectar to feed the adults and for pollen to feed the larvae. Meanwhile, the gueen will continue to lay successive batches of eggs, until, towards the end of the season some of the eggs will develop into queens rather than workers. The old queens and workers will then die and once they have mated with the new queens so do the males. Nesting colonies range in size from a few dozen to several hundred individuals, most of these being workers. When the new queens leave the nest, they will feed to build up fat reserves and once mated seek suitable sites to hibernate. Hibernation sites are usually on a north-facing bank, but it appears the number of hibernation sites available is limited as the same sites are used every year.

In Britain, there are twenty one species of bumblebee, thirteen of which are currently found in Suffolk. Of these only seven species are common and likely to visit gardens. There are a further six species, known as cuckoo bumblebees, which parasitize on true bumblebees. The queen cuckoo bumblebee will kill or subdue the true queen then lays her eggs in the nests of true bumblebees, with the workers tricked into providing the food to sustain the interlopers' progeny - consisting of new queen-like females plus males, but no workers. Cuckoo bumblebees mimic closely the appearance of their host and are not easily distinguished from true bumblebees, although less hairy.

The ability to forage in cool, cloudy even wet weather makes bumblebees highly effective pollinators. Gardens are very important to the survival of bumblebees; a flower rich garden will provide the food they need from March to September. Traditional cottage garden flowers and native wildflowers are the most useful, as bumblebee species differ in the length of their tongues and they provide the necessary variation in flower types. Long-tongued species access nectar from flowers such as foxgloves, comfreys and sages, while short-tongued species prefer brambles and raspberries. But they will also 'nectar rob' deeper flowers by biting a hole a the base of the flower.

WI News

At our April meeting we welcomed Linda Ginn to talk on her recent trip to western Kenya with the charity "Uzima in our Hands". Uzima is swahili for life and hope. The charity raises funds to support vulnerable children in western rural Kenya with education, food and basic health care. Linda was encouraged to go by her friend Sue and Sue's sister Joy who is director of the charity. Joy goes every few years to see what is happening to their fund raising. After a long day of travel the group arrived with 14 cases filled with clothes ,books, medicines and toys to distribute to the children. The schools and homes they visited covered a large area and to get around the most frequent mode of transport was by motorbike- the "picky picky". Linda had to sit on the back and hold on as best she could, usually by clinging to the driver. She did refuse to get on one picky picky that already had 2 passengers and she would have been the third! The motorbikes go along tracks that become footpaths that run out completely but you keep going, quite an experience. Schooling is compulsory but not everyone goes. They found at the schools that many of the children have health issues, cerebral palsy is common because of the lack of pre and post maternity care. There are social workers who visit these children at home and the group were able to go on these visits to see the extra care that was given. The houses range from small thatched huts to larger dwellings with metal corrugated rooves. The cooking is done outside and there are many animals and chickens running around. Linda loved the warmth and generous hospitality of these people.

Besides the helping of children, Linda learned about the "5 Talents Project" which advises local people, mainly women, how to pool their money into savings groups that earn interest and the members can take out loans to start small businesses. Linda saw 3 examples of this: a man who set up a roadside shop selling everything that the locals needed. A woman set up a brick making business using the local clay pits and is now employing others. and a man who set up a picky picky bike rental business. Linda was impressed by this scheme of people helping themselves to achieve a more secure life. Her trip to Kenya made her realise we should all stretch our wings!

Our May meeting is on the 15th at 7:15pm. Our speaker will be Claire Sullivan. "Contemporary Hemporary" working hemp in a traditional way. All are welcome.

- 2 Councillors' Declarations of Interest. See Middleton Moor, below.
- **Public Forum.** A member of the public, representing the Village Green Group, addressed the PC requesting approval to employ a grass cutter for the village green. It was agreed to pay for four cuts at £20 per cut, spread out over a reasonable period. Should more cuts be needed, it was agreed that the Village Green Group will notify the PC. Invoice and bank details to be supplied to the clerk.

The PC agreed to the reimbursement of £20 to Sue Peel for the first grass cutting of the year. Action: Clerk to make payment.

The 'no parking' signs for the village green was raised again. The PC agreed to the purchase of six signs for the village green and three for Middleton Moor. Size 240mm x 360mm @ £14 each.

Action: Cllr Thorpe to send details to the clerk for ordering.

4. Minutes

- a) The Council approved the minutes of the previous meeting held on 12 March 2024 and the extraordinary meeting held on 26 March 2024.
- b) Matters arising and Action Points.
 - An email has been issued to Cllr Whitelock re: 30mph speed limit for the B1122.
 - Steve Merry, SCC has been emailed re: speed limit implementation and stub roads/fly tipping.
 - The speed indicator has come to the end of its useful life and now needs replacing. Action: Clerk to research speed indicator devices. The purchase of a speed gun was discussed, and the safe use thereof; it was agreed that this would also provide valuable data. Action: Cllr Taylor to source.
 - The Suffolk Wildlife Trust have been contacted regarding the pond at Middleton Moor, awaiting reply.
 - CIL has been sent to ESC and is on the village website.
 - A donation has been made to Lighthouse Women's Aid.
 - Defibrillator. The clerk reported that the current pads are unused. They will need replacing February 2025 (if not used before). The current battery will need replacing February 2027. (Pads need renewing every two years, batteries every four years.) The clerk advised the PC of a free reminder service available through defibshop.co.uk and it was agreed to sign up to this. The clerk has sourced an Automated External Defibrillator course and will complete this in due course. Action: Clerk to join the PC to the free reminder service.
 - The Bell Pub, Village Community Asset. The clerk has been in correspondence with both ESC and Adnams. Currently waiting to hear back from ESC, following their request to undertake further research.

5 Sizewell C

Cllr Macdowell provided the PC with an up-to-date report, summarised below.

<u>B1122 Resurfacing</u>. Communication from Sizewell C on this has proved inadequate, putting residents to a great deal of inconvenience.

From the Theberton Hall Farm entrance, the works have taken place in haphazard sections with no warning, and with second 'visits' to lay down a second layer of asphalt. One holiday letting cancelled after the first night, resulting in a monetary loss to the accommodation owner.

<u>Works Tracker</u>. Information placed by Sizewell C on their much-vaunted works tracker website has proved valueless, with vague or deceptive information. Working with Theberton PC on an almost daily basis pressuring Sizewell C to improve this has been slow. The Tracker is intended to be the main day-by-day information source for residents throughout the Sizewell C project.

<u>Diversions</u>. Despite stating that residents would be able to access their properties under escort throughout the works, this has been a lottery at best. One was forced to make a 20-mile diversion having been turned away twice from different checkpoints. Staff manning the checkpoints have been largely ignorant of local routes and options and have not been issued with maps.

Speed limits. We continue to lobby Suffolk County Council and Sizewell C. Even though the number of HGV movements have increased significantly, promised new speed limits including 30mph from the A12 to Leiston Abbey have not yet materialised. SCC have advised besides implementing the speed limits, they are liaising with SZC and the Suffolk Constabulary to see what can be done to encourage compliance. Whilst this is still work in progress it is likely to be a mix of measures starting with softer educational ones, such as staff induction and enforcement of speed limits for SZC HGVs to potential police enforcement by officers or mobile cameras.

<u>Creation of a temporary 20mph zone through Middleton Moor.</u> The PC will be applying for this, guided by SCC's existing policies and scoring process. The process will be challenging, not least because, unless in exceptional circumstances, locations will not be considered for 20mph schemes where the road is classed as A or B and/or they have existing mean speeds above 30 mph.

<u>Stopped-up side roads (or 'Stubs')</u>. These will be created as the new Sizewell Link Road is built and threaten to become fly-tipping 'honeypots'. SCC agree that some form of restriction is_necessary but would prefer demountable lockable bollards to prevent unauthorised access and the risk of tipping or other antisocial behaviour. They would avoid using gates where they would obstruct pedestrians, cyclists, and horse riders. The location will be a matter for detailed design and discussions with adjacent landowners.

<u>Traffic Volumes.</u> Following a request for an update on HGV and other traffic, we have been advised that a running commentary on the number of HGV movements is unavailable (outside of the process when reporting back to SCC and ESC). The number of HGV runs are reported on the ESC website https://www.eastsuffolk.gov.uk/planning/national-infrastructure-and-energy-projects/sizewell-c-nuclear-power-station/governance-groups/ (clarification has been requested, as the data is not visible). It was agreed that there has been an increase in the number of HGV movements, but this is well within the cap of 600.

An acknowledgement and thank you was made to Cllr MacDowell for his daily efforts regarding SZC.

Cllr Lacey is meeting with Cllr Weaver from Kelsale PC on Tuesday 16 April. (Unsuitable for HGV signs, Fordley Road and flooding issues.)

6 Councillors Reports

<u>Substation</u>. The replacement of the existing substation (due to aging transformers and a risk of power cuts in the area) was addressed. A Parish resident has offered land for siting the substation, which would be hidden and much less intrusive than the location proposal by UK Power Networks. Cllr Cusack has presented this offer to the surveyor, who will, in turn, liaise with

his engineer colleagues for comment. If this new site is agreed upon UK Power Networks would like to purchase the land on which the substation would sit.

<u>Pond.</u> Cllr Cusack has been in contact with Natural England, with whom we have a higher-level stewardship agreement, they have, in turn, advised that we contact Suffolk Wildlife Trust requesting comment/advice on our options. This has been done and Cllr Cusack is awaiting a reply. Cllr Taylor has been in touch with another possible contractor, Peter Frizzle, to carry out the pond works. It is anticipated that they will complete their survey and give advice at the end of April. The Clerk advised that the grant application with the National Lottery has a shelf life of 22 May. It was agreed to amend the works start date to the end of the year (not June) and submit the application. Action: Clerk to submit National Lottery application. It was reiterated that the undertaking/commencement of the works is a slow process due to the nature of the job and ensuring that all requirements are met.

Cllr Cusack temporarily left the meeting and Cllr Taylor, as vice-chair, continued.

Moor Maintenance. Causeway Farm will be vacating this year, the actual tenancy coming to an end in October. For a number of years Middleton Parish Council have had an agreement in place with this farm that the Moor is cut once a year with payment as the hay crop. This arrangement has proved adequate but has not really maintained or improved the Moor in respect of ecology. At a recent Moor Management Meeting, residents voiced concerns that areas of the Moor were not attended to and requested clarification for a longer term plan. In late 2022 MPC engaged Suffolk Wildlife Trust to prepare a 10 year Management Plan for the 8 acres, including pond, that make up the Moor. This has recommended a change in the way that the grassland in particular is managed and suggests other methods to improve biodiversity whilst maintaining the habitat for the Great Crested Newts for which we receive a small grant from English Nature. They supplied a list of possible rotational maintenance which includes mowing different sections of the Moor less frequently, management of verges and hedges, coppicing and allowing buffer strips next to hedges.

It is anticipated that the value of any hay crop will be unlikely to fully cover the additional works desired and therefore there will be a regular charge to MPC. As the only revenue received is in a small annual grant from English Nature, MPC are keen to keep such costs to a manageable figure. It was agreed that a number of possible local residents be approached who may possess the necessary land management skills and equipment to invite them to tender for the works with any hay crop as partial payment. In the interests of impartiality, it was agreed that a number of parties need to be invited, one of which may include Nonsuch Farm.

Action Point: Councillor Taylor to research and write to suitable parties.

Cllr Cusack returned and resumed the meeting.

- e) <u>Causeway Farm.</u> Following the meeting on 18 March, Cllrs Piercy and Thorpe and Jack Rosenthal produced a paper which was featured in the village newsletter, inviting responses; one was received questioning the recording of villager's thoughts on the possible development of Back Road. The report will be issued to SCC tomorrow, along with an invitation to meet with County Cllr Richard Smith to discuss further.
 - Cllrs Piercy and Thorpe and Jack were thanked for their work to date on Causeway Farm.

7 Church Access from Village Green

The quote and specification received has been scaled down from a driveway to a pathway that will accommodate a wheelchair with ease. The path size will be approximately 14m x 1.5m at a cost of £4,000. It was questioned whether funding may be sought through the SZC Community Fund or a contribution from the church. Action: Clerk to write to the PCC for funding or a joint grant application.
