WI News

President Lynda welcomed all of us to the April meeting where the plan was to join or renew our membership for the coming year. Forms had to be filled out and subscriptions paid. We then were able to tuck into a buffet supper provided by the Committee. They had prepared jacket potatoes with a choice of various fillings: cheese, coleslaw, coronation chicken, vegetable stew, chili con carne. A healthy green salad was served as well. The fillings seemed popular, with some members trying them all. To finish we had a cup of tea. Lynda thanked everyone who had helped to prepare and to clear up after our supper. Then there was more business to attend to: talking about the 2023 WI Resolution "Clean Rivers for People and Wildlife". Jenny had volunteered to look into the resolution information provided by the WI so she could lead the discussion. The NFWI would campaign for better water quality in our rivers which are contaminated by sewage runoffs and intensive farming. Jenny pointed out that what the resolution seemed to focus more on was the concern of water quality for river swimming than the benefit for saving wildlife. The WI would work with other organizations such as The Rivers Trust to stop this pollution of river water. At the moment the Government says it has a plan to tackle storm overflow (pollution) from water companies but the deadline for ending all overflows isn't until 2050! After some discussion of members thoughts and opinions, many agreed that this resolution was dealing with too narrow an aspect of water pollution (official designated bathing sites in rivers) but that it was a start. Our vote for this resolution to be passed at the Annual NFWI meeting: 15 yes 1 no.

Our next meeting will be May 17th at 7:15pm. Our speaker will be Richard Allenby-Pratt, professional photographer.

Northern lights seen in Middleton – February 27th 2023.





Those of you who only have the hard copy of the newsletter will not have seen these photos of the Aurora Borealis taken in February by Gemma in Back Road. Because they were sent out on 1st April with the electronic version I was asked by a couple if it was an April Fool's joke, but others were wowed by them.

Gemma's reply :

"Definitely not an April Fools! I'm not much of a practical joker.

I follow a Facebook group which alerts me to when there have been solar flares which might then suggest that the Aurora can be seen from Ireland. Since we aren't so very far from Ireland, I try to keep an eye out to see the Northern Lights from here on the East Anglian coast.

The week I took the pictures, there were many published pictures of the Northern Lights taken from Ireland and Scotland but also from Suffolk and Norfolk. April Nature Notes

Our local biodiversity is immense, consisting not only of familiar mammals, birds and plants but also of a range of equally fascinating species, that go mostly unseen and unknown, that play important, if not always appreciated roles in the world around us. A group of such creatures are flatworms or Platyhelminthes (from, Greek platy = flat and helminthes = worms). They are one of our most primitive groups of animals and almost exclusively carnivorous. They occur in freshwater and marine habitats and terrestrially in damp conditions of leaf litter and soil and, species such as flukes and tapeworms live parasitically inside other animals.

Flatworms are very simple soft bodied creatures and as their name suggests flat bodied, the only body cavity is the gut and are not segmented like earthworms. Their few sense organs are congregated at the head of the body, and because there is no blood circulatory system, their bodies are flattened to allow for a productive exchange of oxygen and nutrients to take place by simple diffusion. As they have no anus, undigested material is regurgitated from the mouth. All flatworms are hermaphrodite; they have a complex system of both male and female genitalia and they produce hard-shelled egg cocoons. These are laid in the soil, are small, shiny and black, resembling blackcurrants. Some species are also capable of reproducing by fission, whereas the flatworm divides and the separated segment regenerates and produces a new individual.

The most common flatworm is the free-living Planaria, which can be found in most areas of freshwater. There are four native British species, ranging in size from 5 to 50mm and dark in colour. They look like flattened leeches and move along over a trail of mucus with a creeping slither. They are wholly carnivorous, and partially digest their food externally before sucking them into the gut. If they are cut into several pieces, then each piece will regenerate into a new entire animal; the fragments that were closest to the original head will be the quickest to grow a new head.

Other forms of flatworms are parasitic and have complex lifecycles. *Fasciola hepatica*, the liver fluke, has a flat oval shape and can be up to 3cm long. Fluke eggs are passed out from cattle or sheep in their faeces, develop inside snails until they become mobile when they leave the snail and attach to blades of grass. They are then re ingested by the host animal, and the flukes develop in the liver and bile ducts. The snail infestation is most prevalent in late Spring when it is warm and damp.



Tapeworms named because of their flat but very long bodies are internal parasites of many vertebrates. They use suckers in their heads to hook onto the inside of their primary host, absorbing nutrients from the host's digestive system. The human tapeworm *Taenia saginita*, can reach a size of more than 20m and amazingly, in some parts of the world, people will deliberately ingest a beef tapeworm as a means of losing weight. As with flukes, eggs are excreted by the host, and are then passed on to cattle and pigs feeding on contaminated vegetation. The life cycle is completed when a person eats undercooked infected meat.

1. Attendance and Apologies

2. <u>Councillors' Declarations of Interest.</u> None

3. <u>Public Forum.</u> None

The Chairman reported that the Parish Council elections in May will be uncontested because only 6 candidates were nominated for the 9 places: Julian Cusack, Graham Lacey, Charles Macdowell, Christopher Reynolds, Lesley Taylor & Stephen Thorpe. Results of the Parish Council uncontested election and the notice of the District Council Election will be posted on the notice board. Expenses forms to be returned to ESC. The Parish Council will be able to co-opt to fill the 3 vacancies following on from the AGM.

4. Appointment of Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer.

The Council confirmed the terms of an offer made to an applicant for the position of Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer as previously circulated.

The Chairman introduced and welcomed the newly appointed Parish Clerk, Rachael Salcombe who was present to observe the meeting. Her contract has been signed in acceptance of the role and a handover will be arranged with the previous Clerk. The Chairman acknowledged thanks to Sharon Smith for all her work as Clerk to the Parish Council. He also thanked the Locum Clerk for her help during the transition period.

5. <u>Minutes.</u>

The Council approved the minutes of the meeting on 14_{th} March 2023 as an accurate record.

Matters Arising.

The Chairman reported that at the last meeting in the public forum, a member of the public proposed to brighten up the village green and to replant with grass seed. Since then the grass on the green has been scarified by the Village Green Group and 1kg of grass seed has been sourced. The Council expressed support for this project including consideration of a request for finance should this be forthcoming from the Group.

6. <u>Sizewell C</u>

Cllr Macdowell advised that he has the feedback from the first meeting and is working on a combined letter to EDF. The comments mainly relate to the particular projects and speed limits in their own villages. He will compile the feedback to date, but is still waiting to hear back from Darsham. He will circulate some dates to hold a meeting after the elections and to invite EDF along with the other parishes. Middleton to host the meeting. The Chairman thanked Cllr Macdowell for his work.

7. <u>Finance</u>

a) To note that the draft accounts for the year ended 31st March 2023 have been prepared by the previous Clerk and are due to be submitted for internal audit on 17th April.

It is hoped that the accounts can be signed off at the AGM.

The Chairman informed that he had seen a proposal from County Broadband to install a broadband cabinet/box on the Moor close to the junction of Moor Road and to attach to the power supply there. It was agreed by all that the siting of this cabinet in such a prominent position should be opposed.

b) Planning Matter.

Cllr Macdowell would like to declare an interest in a planning application which he has submitted to the district council.

The Chairman apologised that he had missed the notification of the planning application which had been sent to the Clerks email address: DC/23/1113/LBC Listed Building Consent, proposed conversion of agricultural building at Valley Farm, Leiston Road, Middleton to accommodate bats roosting. The Parish Council agreed that they would have no objection to the application as they had not objected to the original application when submitted. To be included on the agenda for the AGM and to confirm no objection.

9. <u>Items for the Next Agenda.</u> Planning Application DC/23/1113/LBC.

10. <u>Next Meeting</u>

The Council agreed the date and time of the Annual Parish meeting which is scheduled for Tuesday 16th May 2023 at 6:00pm at the Village Hall. Parish Council Report April 2023

Parish Council

There were only six nominations for the nine places on the Parish Council so there will be no Parish Council elections this year, unlike in 2019 when we had 10 nominations.

This means that the Council can co-opt up to 3 additional members and we would therefore like to hear from anyone resident in the Parish who might be interested in joining us.

The Parish Council has a varied and interesting workload which includes consideration (as Consultee) of Planning Applications in the Parish, operation of the Recreation Ground (of which it is the Trustee) and the Village Hall drop-in centre. The Parish Council also has management responsibility for the Village Green and Middleton Moor.

Recreation Ground and Pavilion

We have agreed a new scale of charges for hire of the pavilion which replaces the previous arrangement where we asked for a donation. This is intended to cover more of our costs and provide greater certainty to hirers.

£25 for a single session AM, PM or evening (£15 for village residents)
£40 for all day (£30 for village residents)
£40 for afternoon + evening (£30 for village residents)
£25 per day for charitable and fund-raising events.
