#### Middleton Dark Skies

<u>Planets on View.</u> Venus rises in the eastern sky at around 3.00 AM, shinning brightly in the pre-dawn sky. Look out for the crescent Moon sitting just above Venus on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of the month. **Mars** will be the only planet visible this month in the night sky, sitting in the western twilight after sunset. It sets at around 1.00 AM, so is only visible for a few hours. On the 17<sup>th</sup> Mars and Regulus, the brightest star in the constellation of Leo, will be sitting right next to each other low in the Western sky. Through a pair of binoculars, the distinctive red colour of Mars and the bright blue white of Regulus will be in distinct contrast to each other. **Jupiter** is moving behind the Sun, so is lost in its glare this month. **Saturn** is a pre-dawn object, rising in the East at around 2.00 AM. It has the Moon for company on the morning of the 19<sup>th</sup>.

<u>Constellations</u>. Worth looking out for this month is Cygnus (The Swan, also known as the Northern Cross). It's quite easy to see how its name was arrived at, it's one of the few constellations that, with very little imagine lends itself to its name. At present it is high up in the eastern sky and doesn't have too many prominent stars nearby, and is a large constellation, so should be fairly easy to spot. As one of its names suggests is shaped like a cross. The Milky Way runs through and along the length of Cygnus, but given the lighter skies this month it may be a little difficult to spot, although binoculars will still pick out thousands of stars.

<u>The Moon.</u> Known as the Strawberry or Rose Moon this month, following the first crop of strawberries and the blooming of roses. Full Moon this month occurs on the 10<sup>th</sup>, and sees an event that only occurs once in every 19 years. This is known as 'The Major Standstill' where the Moon has stopped moving south in its orbital cycle and begins to move back north again. So, this month the Full Moon will only rise to about 10° above the southern horizon. It also means that the points at which the Moon rises and sets are at their closest possible. On the 19<sup>th</sup> the Moon will be sitting by Saturn and on the 22<sup>nd</sup> it will be just above Venus. Both of these take place in the Eastern pre-dawn sky.

**Meteors** Unfortunately no showers this month, but always a chance of catching a rough one.

#### June Nature Notes

Slow-worms, often mistaken for snakes, are actually legless lizards. Unlike snakes, lizards, including the slowworm have eyelids that blink and a flat forked tongue. Slow-worms have a shiny appearance, the males are a greyish brown and the females are brown with dark sides. They can grow to 45cm of which the tail accounts for over half of their total body length. Slow-worms hibernate from mid to late October to late February or early March depending on weather. The mating season for slow worms starts in May when males become aggressive towards one another. During courtship, the male takes hold of the female by biting her head or neck, and they intertwine their bodies. Courtship may last for as long as 10 hours. Females incubate the eggs internally, 'giving birth' to an average of eight

young in late-summer. Slow-worms have been recorded living for up to 30 years in wild, and the greatest age for a slow worm in captivity is 54 years.

Slow-worms are exothermic (they do not create their own body temperature) thereby are reliant on basking in warm areas in order to raise body heat to a level at which they become active. They lead a somewhat secretive life, spending most of their time hidden under vegetation, or in holes below ground. Many different habitats provide suitable features for




slow-worms such as woodland rides, tussocky grassland, hedgerows and gardens so long as there are sufficient sunny basking areas.

If a slow-worm cannot avoid contact with a predator, it has two major defence mechanisms. When caught, the slow-worm will readily defecate, and although the faeces are not as foul smelling as that of the grass snake, it may be sufficiently unpleasant to deter some predators. However, the main defence mechanism of the slow-worm is caudal autonomy. It can voluntarily shed its tail, which will wriggle violently for several minutes, distracting the predator whilst the slow-worm escapes. The tail will regrow, but never reaches its original length, and may appear discoloured compared to the rest of the body. Slow-worms will bite in defence, but their teeth do not protrude far from the gums, and the bite is relatively ineffective.


Many species of bird will readily take slow-worms, including pheasants, corvids, birds of prey and even woodpeckers. Pheasants pose the greatest threat, as they are ground birds, and hunt in the deep vegetation that is the preferred habitat of the slow-worm. Mammalian threats are mainly posed by hedgehogs and badgers. Gardens, particularly with compost heaps, where they find warmth from decaying vegetation are important slow-worm habitats and they are useful to attract into the garden as they will feed on a variety of garden pests, notably slugs and snails. However, this brings them into contact with domestic cats, which probably account for more slow-worm deaths than natural predators.

Annual Report for Parish Council

May 2025

Our numbers have held steady this year, however, in order for the WI to continue there have been committee level changes. Rita is now the president, with Lynda continuing in her role of secretary, we have a new treasurer, Jess. We are grateful Rita has returned to this familiar role, to ensure the committee is able to function correctly.

A third of our membership travel from towns and villages beyond Middleton. Many of those members are reluctant to travel on our local roads at night, particularly as so many roads are closed, requiring long detours along narrow country lanes due to the preparation work being undertaken for SZC. As a result we changed some meetings during the winter months to afternoon meetings. We may have to consider making similar changes again this year.

But as an operative, local organisation we have been as active as ever throughout the year. We continue to support members of the community who may be unable to leave their homes or who maybe experiencing difficulties. At Christmas we collected an enormous range of items for the women's refuge The Lighthouse Centre in Ipswich, including toys, household items, deodorants, soaps, and gifts. The generosity of our members was quite overwhelming.

Our speakers throughout the year have been varied, highly informative and entertaining. Claire Sullivan shared her workings with hemp in a traditional way, 'Blood, Sweat & Fears,' was an enthralling if not emotionally moving talk given by Mary Newton a pathologist. Malcolm Knott shared his experiences with his lifetime in law, whilst 'The True Cost of Fish,' was discussed by Andy Malcolm from The Fishermen's Mission. This year award winning photographer and RSPB expert David Naylor discussed birds & habitat at the Minsmere Reserve. At Christmas we welcomed the Sizewell Gap. What an evening of music and hilarious entertainment, we shall have to invite them back again.

As always the WI has supported community events during the year, despite the rain we experienced at the Summer Fete and the Autumn Fair. Two of our members assist with the Thursday Coffee morning group every week. The WI very generously supported the recent art exhibition that was held in Middleton. They baked, they donated cakes and pastries, they washed up, ran the raffle and generally gave their time and enthusiasm.

The Summer Garden Party was held at Suncot in Lynda's garden , on a glorious summer's day. We had our usual New Year Welcome meal at The Wentworth where we were well looked after. We continue to run clubs beyond our regular meetings, Book Club and Garden Club are organised by members, we hope to re-establish Lunch Club later this year.

Our main priority for the coming year is to ensure the WI in Middleton continues, many WIs in the area have closed due to lack of members. We will strive to continue with our support to the local community and beyond.

#### ANNUAL REPORT FOR MIDDLETON-cum-FORDLEY VILLAGE HALL 2024-25

The year began with some difficulties over contractors parking at the Village Hall when it was being used by clients and in particular Pilates. These issues were eventually resolved and the house owners made a generous donation for the inconveniences caused.

General maintenance continues with issues to the gent's urinal, guttering and flooring. A grant of £750 was returned to the Adnams Charity when we found a cheaper solution for the outside concreting costing just £100.

A new roller for indoor bowls was installed following match funding from MCC.

National Lottery funding of £7000 and £400 from Cllr Richard Smith's Locality Budget enabled the installation of two new double external doors to the front and rear lobbies and a new double glazed door to the kitchen.

In November a Quiz raised the princely sum of £ 437 minus expenses.

The Coffee morning organisers hosted a well attended Arts and crafts Exhibition to raise funds to enable the future continuance of the community event. They also made a generous donation to the VH to help cover their previously free use of rent and electricity.

Two gardening sessions were organised by one of our PC representatives, Steve Thorpe, in order to enhance and maintain our wild garden bank at the rear of the VH.

A music system donated by lifelong resident Jimmy Adams has now been installed to enable the playing of Cd's and Vinyl at events.

In March 2025, Anglian Water did a survey and confirmed that there are no lead pipes feeding the supply.

Regular weekly activities continue with Pilates, Indoor Bowls, Art Sessions, Coffee mornings. There are monthly meetings of the Heritage Quilters, Women's Institute and Parish Council and quarterly meetings of the Village Hall and Community Council Committees. These lettings and occasional quizzes in aid of the Village Hall, Community Council and School all contribute to our regular income to cover utility bills and maintenance, upkeep and improvement of services.

Our thanks go to our regular cleaner, Kevin, who has helped to maintain high levels of cleanliness. Many thanks go to all members of the Village Hall Management Committee for their continuing support, advice and time. Particular thanks go to our Secretary, Barbara, grant seeker extraordinaire and Treasurer, Yvonne who keep the administrative wheels in good order.

#### Newsletter Report for the Annual Parish meeting 2025

Middleton Newsletter is published monthly – except January - and is delivered by a stalwart team along with the Fisherman magazine. The split between hard copy and the email version remains at around 50/50. Most new residents in the village have been happy to supply an email contact.

All village organisations regularly submit details of upcoming events, reports of events after they've happened, meeting minutes etc. and annual donations are received from these organisations. Private individuals also donate from time to time, including those who choose to publish a Christmas greeting in lieu of sending cards. Those who choose to advertise their business are encouraged to make a donation though there are currently no set fees. #### RECYCLING ELECTRICALS



East Suffolk Council \*\*

East Suffolk Council - 4h

Kerbside collections of small electrical items are now being rolled out across the whole of East Suffolk!

Collections will begin in the coming weeks and will enable you to leave small electrical items on top of your wheeled bins on your usual bin collection day. The items will then be collected by the refuse crew and taken away for recycling. There is no need to put the items in a bag.

Look out for a leaflet advising when collections will start in your area.

Collected items will be sorted for recycling or where appropriate, given to local charities The Repair Shed in Martlesham and the Benjamin Foundation in Lowestoft for repair before selling the items to raise money.


To try and manage demand on the service, please leave no more than 2 small electrical items, unbagged, out for collection each week. If the collection basket on the refuse vehicle is full, items can be collected the following week.

This is one of over 60 UK projects funded by Material Focus, the not for profit leading the Recycle Your Electricals campaign, who have provided £60,724 to support this project.
