

WI News

At our January 2023 meeting Gary Doy came to talk about his service with the Southwold Lifeboat. He has recently retired but his service began in 1980 when he needed to be rescued. Before they would, he was made to promise that he himself would join the lifeboat crew! A fisherman by trade, his father and his grandfather had also been lifeboat volunteers. He worked his way up from "newbie" crew to Station Operations Manager who says nay or yay to the boat going out. On the books there are 19 crew and a doctor.



Training used to be done as you went along with a year's probation before you were allowed to join permanently. Now the training is by the book and there is even a Lifeboat College in Poole.

The beginning of the Southwold Lifeboat service was in 1841 when there were two boats on the beach. In 1928 the boats were moved to the harbour and in 1940 the largest boat went to Dunkirk. After the war a small boat was kept in the garage of the Harbour Inn and a slipway was used to launch into the river. Now, kept in the "Shed" in the harbour and launched by crane and pushed out on tracks into the water, is a state of the art Atlantic 85 inflatable boat. Hand built on the Isle of Wight, this £250 million craft (donated by Tranmere House Sutton Hoo) can go 6.2 knots (45 mph), has an electronic plotter with screen (olden day crew, being fisherman, would use the map of the sea that was in their heads), uses water as ballast in the bow and is open at the back. The crew of four are strapped in by their feet: helmsman, radio operator, navigator, and "eyes" at the back (usually a newbie). When there is a call, the boat can be launched in 10 or 11 minutes. Every volunteer has their own kit hanging in the shed. The kit consists of a full body fleece that goes under an all-in-one waterproof suit with boots attached and many outside pockets for gloves, medical cards etc. The lifejacket has satellite positioning, flares, whistle, hood with windscreen and buddy lines to hook members together if needed. When inflated the jacket can act as a liferaft. The crash helmet has inflatable insides for a secure fit and a microphone to talk to other crew.

The "shouts" are usually for breakdowns, dogs in the river, kite surfers, swimmers, searches, and drifting inflatables. If any medical treatment is given during the rescue, it must be recorded on the medical card accurately. Unfortunately litigation is common these days, people will sue even when being rescued. There are about 18-19 shouts a year in the Southwold-Sizewell area, a reduction compared to past years which might be due to better health and safety education of the public.

Recruitment for the lifeboat these days is getting harder. There are not as many young people living and working locally as there were and fewer businesses who are willing to let their employees go off when needed. In the past most of the lifeboat volunteers were fisherman or worked for Adnams Brewery. Gary gave us a very interesting and informative talk and after asking him many questions and thanking him, it was time for tea.

In February we shall have our "Christmas" lunch instead of an evening meeting.



February Nature Notes

Most hedgerows in this area of Suffolk date from the piecemeal enclosure of land before the seventeenth century, with many dating from medieval times. The original purpose of hedges was to provide a stock proof barrier, with an extra benefit of providing sources of wood for building and other countryside trades. Traditionally hedge laying is usually thought of as the main method of management, but often in Suffolk coppicing (cutting to ground level) was practised. When hedges were being coppiced the associated ditch was usually scoured. The soil dug out was dumped on to the adjacent hedge bank; explaining the traditional legal position regarding boundaries, which are deemed to run not along the line of the hedge but along the further side of the ditch.



Today hedges are primarily valued for their scenic qualities and for their roles as habitats for wildlife. In an agricultural landscape hedgerows provide the greatest source of biodiversity; over 2000 insect species alone are associated with hedges. However, a number of issues influence the wildlife value of each hedge. Factors such as, the botanical composition, both of the shrubs which form the hedge and the associated ground flora, the structure of the hedge and associated features, how the hedge connects with others and with other habitat features, as well as the hedgerow management regime. For instance, hawthorn has over 200 associated insect species, whereas holly has only 10 and a mixed species hedge that provides a continuous display of flowers is more important for many bees, wasps and flies than single species hedges. Likewise, hedgerows that form part of a network that connects other habitats such as woods, meadows and streams and hedges that have associated banks, verges and ditches, or have a number of hedgerow trees have greater ecological value.

Management is essential; hedges that are cut regularly can have great wildlife diversity, although other studies have shown that less intensive management, especially of hedgerow bottoms aids diversity. Ideally the hedge should be thick and bushy, an A-shaped hedge provides maximum protection for wildlife, as this type is more beneficial especially to many birds than thin straggly hedges. Hedges should only be cut in winter, ideally in early February. Hedge maintenance should not be done between March and August as birds are nesting, and it is illegal to intentionally damage or destroy the nest of any wild bird. If possible delay maintenance until late autumn, as fruits are valuable food for birds. As fruit is usually borne on last year's growth it is usually better to cut hedges every other year. Different hedge sizes, types and features are of value to different species, so the best hedges for wildlife have a varied character along their length and will attract a wider range of wildlife.

The newsletter expenditure exceeded the income in 2022 by £672.34 – a big jump from last year's deficit £ 364.51. When the carry forward is added we have a balance of £1036.78 – considerably less than 1^{st} January 2022 which was £1709.12

Printing costs for Leiston Press have inevitably gone up, the costs vary depending on the number of pages per edition and the number of copies printed which now stands at 115 (around half of the village) with more people requesting to go back to paper, or new residents coming in that I don't have emails for. It is a possibility in the future that we may have to go back to black and white printing instead of colour which would be a shame as the people receiving email versions would still see it in colour .

HSBC introduced monthly charges in 2022 with additional charges for depositing cheques.

Thank you everyone for your continued support and donations, particularly the Christmas greetings which raised almost as much as the rest of the year of individual ones. (not too late if you forgot!) Thank you too, to our regular team of deliverers - Diane, Mark, Val, Angela, Bev, Lesley, Renny, Jean, Liz, June - Jackie who has kindly taken over Rectory Road deliveries most of the time – and Irene who stands in from time to time.

2. **Councillors' Declarations of Interest**

Cllr. Chris Reynolds declared an interest in item 7.

3. **Public Forum**

District Cllr. Tom Daly summarised his previously circulated report. Highlights included: the launch of the Field to Fork scheme which offers grants of up to £2,000 to community farms and allotments; the launch of a Cost of Living Community Grant Fund which enables voluntary organisations and community groups to support individuals and families who are struggling with the cost of living crisis; a network of thirty-one Warm Rooms are open across Suffolk; the East Suffolk Walking and Cycling Strategy has been adopted; and free parking is available in ESC car parks on selected dates over the Christmas period. Further details about the highlighted items are available on ESC's website or from the Ward Members. Cllr. Daly concluded his report by informing the Council that it may apply for membership of the Nuclear Free Local Authorities Group if it wishes.

4. **Vacancies**

- The Council noted the resignation of the Parish Clerk/Responsible Financial Officer. The Chairman advised that the vacancy had been advertised in the village newsletter and on the Suffolk Association of Local Councils website.
- b) There were no applications for the Councillor vacancy.
- 5. **Minutes** The Council approved as accurate the minutes of the meeting held on 8th November 2022.

6. **Finance Advisory Group**

The Council considered the report and draft budget for the financial year 2023-2024 from the Finance Advisory Group. It was agreed to accept the budget.

ACTION: Clerk to upload the budget to the website.

b) The Council agreed to set the parish precept for the financial year 2023/2024 at £8,829.00. This is a charge of £42.11 per annum for a Band D property and will show as a 5% change on the Council Tax bill against the Parish element.

ACTION: Clerk to inform the District Council.

7. **Planning**

Due to the declaration of interest by Cllr. Chris Reynolds, the Council was not quorate to consider planning application DC/22/4430/FUL - Demolition of existing two storey dwelling to propose new replacement dwelling -Hill House, Title Road. It was agreed to convene an extraordinary meeting to consider the application. ACTION: Clerk to circulate dates for an extraordinary meeting.

8. **Energy Projects**

The Chairman said the minutes from the latest Sizewell C B1122 Early Years Working Group meeting were not yet available and would be circulated to the Councillors in due course.

ACTION: Clerk to circulate minutes.

- b) The Chairman reported on the first joint meeting of neighbouring Parish Councils to consider EDF and SCC Highways' proposals for the B1122 and B1125 during the Early Years' phase. Representatives from Theberton and Eastbridge, Blythburgh, Westleton and Yoxford Parish Councils attended. Apologies were received from Kelsale, Darsham and Walberswick Parish Councils. The Chairman and Cllr. Lynda Whitbread said the meeting was useful to share information and experience about the interventions in other parishes. The Clerk's notes will be circulated to Councillors shortly. The group agreed to meet again in February 2023. ACTION: Clerk to circulate notes.
- c) The Council approved the Chairman's response to the National Grid Sea Link public consultation. ACTION: Clerk to submit.

9. Councillors' and Clerk's Reports

- a) Drop-In Centre the Council noted the receipt of an ESC Cost of Living Grant for £1,000 to support the Drop-In Centre. Cllr. Lynda Whitbread reported that the Centre has been well attended and a Christmas lunch has been arranged for nineteen residents on 15th December 2022. The Centre will then take a break over Christmas and resume on 5th January 2023. The Council approved expenditure of up to £100 from the grant in response to Cllr. Lesley Taylor's request to fund Christmas hampers for the most vulnerable in the parish who are unable to attend the Christmas lunch.
- b) Middleton Moor the Chairman reported that a meeting of the Moor Management Group has been arranged for 16th December 2023 which he and Cllr. Lynda Whitbread will attend.
- e) ESC Community Partnership the Chairman reported that he attended the latest meeting of the partnership which has a fund of £25,000 per annum to spend on community initiatives. The partnership is hoping to offer a grant scheme to support capital expenditure on village halls for replacement heating systems, electric vehicle car chargers and insulation. There was also a discussion about expanding youth activities in the area.

10. Administration

- a) The Council conducted the annual review of the Risk Assessment and approved the changes.
- b) The Council agreed to appoint the Suffolk Association of Local Councils as internal auditor.
- c) The Council agreed meeting dates for 2023.

11. Finance

- a) The Council noted the latest financial position and verified last month's approved payments.
- b) The Council approved the bank reconciliation for Quarter 2 2022-2023.
- c) The Council agreed to fund the Quiet Lanes signage from Community Infrastructure Levy receipts.
- d) The Council agreed to donate £100 to the Citizens' Advice Service East Suffolk.





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
