Piano Concert at Holy Trinity Church, Middleton 3pm Sunday 22nd October



Many Middleton residents will know Reiko Fujisawa who, when work allows, lives in the village. What many might not know is that Reiko is an internationally renowned concert pianist (see brief biography below and her website: www.reikofujisawa.com). She has felt so welcomed in the village that she has offered to give a concert in the church at 3pm on Sunday October 22nd. Middleton residents will have 'first refusal' on tickets so we are publicising this early in our newsletter before we advertise further afield. The concert will see music from Beethoven, Brahms, Schubert and Sarasate, and Reiko will perform with the renowned violinist Ofer Falk.

Ticket prices are set simply to cover costs (not least hiring and moving a Steinway piano!) and will be available for just £15. These can be reserved by emailing Paul Taylor (from The Old Post Office) on taylogmail.com. Paul will then contact you with payment details. Tickets will be allocated on a strictly first-come-first-served basis. The concert will be opened up to non-Middleton residents from August 1st and we expect strong interest, so if you want to be sure of reserving a place for this very special occasion then do contact Paul asap.

Reiko Fujisawa fuses the sensibilities of a musician raised in the Far East who trained in the West. She appears at prestigious venues and festivals all over the UK and overseas including Wigmore Hall, Purcell Room, King's Place, Stoller Hall, Brighton Festival and Hebden Bridge Piano Festival, and was a featured artist at the Japan 2001 Festival. Reiko has broadcast on BBC Radio 3 and her recordings include an acclaimed CD of music by Bach, Beethoven and Schubert, which The Arts Desk found "irresistible". Her recording of Bach's Goldberg Variations also received a glowing review from The Record Geijutsu, Japan's equivalent to The Gramophone, describing it as an "unpretentious, clean and refreshing performance with a refined dignity". Her most recent project is "Nature & Music", a series of four chamber music programmes that focus on the tangible and spiritual aspects of nature and aim to inspire audiences to admire the beauty and importance of the natural world through music, and to think about our environment from a fresh perspective.

Middleton-cum-Fordley Village Hall Centenary

The Village Hall was originally built as a meeting place for the Women's Institute and was also suitable for other communal village events as it had a stage and a small kitchen and was heated by a coal fired boiler.

The cost of the building was around £300 (over £23,000 today) and was supported by a loan secured through Lady Hambling and Sir Guy Hambling of Rookery Park Yoxford. Fundraising and public subscription ensured that by the time the building had been completed under the able supervision of local builder Mr S. Free, two thirds of this sum had already been raised.

There was great excitement on the opening day and many people gathered early for the ceremony. Upon entering, a speech outlining the aims of the WI was delivered by the President. There were numerous stalls and a 'fine art gallery' under the management of Miss Hart.

In the early evening Sir Guy Hambling presented a cinema show (film unknown) which was followed by a Whist Drive of eighteen tables. A newspaper report describes the prizes as 'of a very valuable nature'. Various draws and competitions contributed to £20 (£1500 today!) being raised towards the cost of the building and it was hoped that the remaining amount would be paid off during the winter months.

The article, entitled Middleton's Red Letter Day, concludes:

'Although small, the Middleton Branch of the Women's Institute, has big ideals and furthermore has the will to achieve them. May the same success which has rewarded its activities in the past continue with it during the coming months—and always.'

Those members would be amazed and very pleased to know that the organisation still continues 100 years later.

The Centenary celebrations will take place over the weekend of Saturday and Sunday 22nd/23rd July 2023 between 11am and 4pm each day.

There will be light refreshments including centenary cakes, provided by a team of volunteers including members of the WI, along with displays of books and pictures connected with the village and a photographic exhibition.

There will be a competition for the best **collaged** picture of the village hall – any medium can be used. A photo of the hall is provided at the end of this newsletter for those who wish to participate. It can be cut out and used as a template, or you can cover it with collage, or just use it for reference - up to you. Please keep to the A4 size though as space to display will be limited. Please bring entries to the hall from 3pm on Friday 21st July.

A rolling slide show will present events from around the world which have taken place each year over the last century along with music from past decades.

A large commemorative 100% cotton tea towel with an original black and white photograph of the Trustees and Committee members outside the new building will be on sale for £5 each, all funds going to the upkeep and maintenance of the hall.

The hall is still well used throughout the week for a variety of activities and has recently seen many upgrades and renovations including a new kitchen, new lighting, new pitched and flat roofs, improved toilet facilities, double glazing, broadband connection, internal re-painting, designated disabled parking area, planting on the outside bank, and during the summer will have the original wooden floor sanded and sealed.

So please take the opportunity to come along and see the many photographs and items held in the Archive on open display in the Village Hall and please remember to bring some cash to buy a tea towel or two! Village Hall Committee 2023.


Some more from the open gardens -





WI News

AT our June meeting we had the pleasure of meeting Graham and Sylvia Hawes and Sylvia's guide dog, Yara, a lovely golden retriever. Yara is her third guide dog and she was matched with Yara in 2016. Sylvia told us that she had very bad eyesight as a girl which prevented her from training to be a nurse. She married and raised 4 children and then worked in nursing homes caring for dementia patients which she loved. But in 2003 her eyesight suddenly deteriorated and she had to stop working. She was then advised that she was eligible for a guide dog.

Sylvia then told us about the charity Guide Dogs. Their National Centre is in Warwickshire where the breeding and training are done. Potential breeding dogs are health checked and screened for any genetic abnormalities and then suitable matches are made. The chosen dogs live in volunteers' homes. When the time comes the puppies are born at home and live there for 6 weeks. They are then transported to the National Centre to live in family groups and are



chipped at 7 weeks. Puppies in one brood are given names starting with the same letter. As they grow they are assessed for their abilities and personalities. Each dog will then go to the home of a volunteer puppy "raiser". The puppy goes to training school at the Centre during the day and then goes home to the raiser after classes. The training by professionals at the Centre includes agility training, getting used to the harness, walking on pavements, going into shops and cafes, using public transport and responding to commands. Living with the raiser gets them used to a home and what they can and cannot do there (getting up on the furniture is a no-no!). At 18 months old, the dog is matched with a person on the waiting list. They take into account the personality of the dog and client, walking speed of both and the size of person and dog. They meet and spend 2 weeks at a hotel getting used to each other before they go to the client's home. If there are any problems there are advisors on hand. Guide Dogs will pay all the client's expenses for the upkeep of the dog throughout its' working life. The average working life is 10 years, then they are retired. The cost for the breeding, training and upkeep of each working dog is £58,000. Sylvia says that for her and all the others that benefit from the freedom it gives them, it is priceless.

While Sylvia was giving her talk, Yara was showing us what a very relaxed and obedient dog she is, very unfazed even when we oohed and ahhed. She is a star.

Our July meeting will be our Garden Party which will be on the 19th at 4pm.

July Nature Notes

Each summer, during July and August, huge numbers of flying ants suddenly appear. These are a mixture of males and potential queens embarking on their "nuptial" or "mating" flight, in the first step to founding a new colony.

There are some 50 species of ant in Britain, although, the ones that we commonly see swarm are the black garden ant, *Lasius niger*. The common red ant *Myrmica rubra* and other but not all species also swarm. The types of ant you see flying will depend on where you are. For example, in woodland you may see wood ants. There is not a single 'flying ant day', there are multiple peaks in flying ant activity linked to weather conditions each lasting a few days. The precise pattern varies from year to year. Ants only fly on days when it is warm, not windy and conditions have improved compared to the previous day. Periods of low pressure cause wind and rain discourages the ants from emerging. The large numbers of ants that fly in a short space of time means that there is a very high chance a queen will encounter a male from another nest. Swarming consistently takes place between 3 and 6 pm, sufficient time to mate and find somewhere to hide but not too much time for exposure to predators. Flying ants provide an important food resource for many species of birds, particularly swifts and gulls; the excited squawking of feasting gulls is often the first sign of flying ant day.



An ant colony can only expand so much. At some point a new queen will need to strike out on her own to begin a new colony. To reduce the likelihood of inbreeding she needs to meet and mate with a male from a different colony and find a new area in which to start building her nest. Growing wings and flying enables her to do this. Male ants are only produced during 'flying ant season': their only job is to mate with new queens and therefore male ants do no work within the nest. Once the males and immature queens have mated, the queens then start a new nest by digging an underground chamber. In this chamber the queen lays her first eggs. The eggs hatch into larvae, which feed up, pupate, and emerge as adult ants. For most of the year that ants that are seen are workers, collecting food for the colony. Black garden ant nests have around 5,000 workers, although there can be as many as 15,000. Workers are all female and will be alive as adults for about a month and male ants only live for a day or two after swarming, whereas a queen can expect to live for 15 years or more (28 years is the record in captivity). The queen is not in charge of the workers: her job is to lay eggs to create more workers, as well as new queens and males. Ants are able to form organised feeding trails by using pheromones to communicate. Some colonies of black garden ants farm aphids for the sugary honeydew they excrete. In return, they protect the aphid colonies from attack by predators and will even carry individual aphids to fresh host plants so that new colonies can be founded.

2 Councillors' Declarations of Interest. None.

3 Public Forum

a) A member of the public addressed the Council regarding a new advertisement board erected outside Norwood House and whether permission is required for such a sign. Cllr Cusack confirmed that permission is not required. Cllr Lacey added that as a temporary non fixed structure, permission is not normally needed. Action: Cllr Cusack to seek confirmation that the sign is temporary and for how long it will be there.

An enquiry was also made regarding County Broadband and the location of the cabinet on the Moor. Cllr Cusack confirmed that the Parish has objected to the location of the cabinet and that he is still waiting for a response.

There are 4 ploughs stored at The Bell Inn, they have been cleaned and painted and are looking for a new home. Councillors were asked to give this some thought.

4 Minutes

- a) The Council approved the minutes of the Annual Parish Council meeting on 16th May 2023 as accurate.

- c) Matters arising

Cllrs Reynolds and Thorpe are yet to declare any Declarations of Interest. Action: Clerk to check that Cllrs Thorpe and Macdowell have submitted their Declarations of Interest. The Clerk confirmed that Richard Turner has been advised that Cllr Lacey will be representing the Parish Council at the Village Hall Management meetings. Cllr Cusack confirmed that Cllr Macdowell has the next meeting, with local Parishes, regarding Sizewell C, in hand. Cllr Thorpe has sourced a local company to provide a plaque for the replacement bench at a cost of £35. Authorisation was given to order and purchase. Cllr Cusack advised that he is yet to prepare a new signage request for Fordley Road. Cllr Thorpe to address the issue of the outstanding fallen sign along with numerous others and reminded Councillors of the Highways Portal for the submission of known fallen signs.

Cllr Cusack continues to pursue the issued of permissive paths but had nothing to report at this stage. Cllr Thorpe confirmed that he has introduced himself, via email, to the Summer Wine Group.

5 Councillors' Reports

- a) Village Hall. Action: Cllr Lacey to get in touch with Richard Turner, as the new contact.
- b) Middleton Primary School. Nothing to report, other than it is the school's annual sports day on 14th June.
- c) Energy Project, including Sizewell C. Cllr Macdowell absent.
- d) Highways, footpath and trees. Cllr Thorpe raised the issue of dog mess on the footpaths. Action: Cllr Thorpe to contact holiday let companies to ask that their patrons be mindful of the pathways and clean up after their dogs. A request was also made that the footpaths across fields are made wider. Action: Cllr Thorpe with talk with local farmers.

6 Middleton Moor

Cllr Cusack advised that the south end of the pond is rapidly growing an island of willow. He met with a grounds work contractor who, in turn, recommended a pond specialist. Cllr Cusack reminded the Councillors that the Parish are responsible for the pond. To date it is planned to erect a temporary ramp and use a digger to extract material from the island. Cllr Lacey suggested that there are long reach machines available that could eliminate the need for a ramp. Although this piece of equipment would be more expensive to hire, it could potentially be more cost effective. Cllr Cusack advised that proper disposal of the waste material will need to be considered too, respecting local fauna and flora. Action: Cllr Lacey to investigate the option of a longer reach machine. Cllr Cusack recommended a window of opportunity to carry out the work to be November/ December and that the Middleton Moor fund currently holds £3,000, which is intended for such works.

7 Finance

- a) The latest financial position was received and accepted by all.
- £300 is budgeted for the village newsletter. Barbara Barker has reported a deficit at the present time and Cllr Cusack has suggested an additional one-off donation of £500. This was agreed by all.
- c) Authorisation was given for the payment of £12 to IONOS Cloud Ltd.

8 Planning

Planning application DC/23/2037/FUL. It was agreed that this application is considered to be a suitable redevelopment of the property. Action: Clerk to enter approval on Planning Portal.

9 Correspondence

A local resident has written to Cllr Cusack regarding fast traffic on Back Road. This is a 20mph zone. The resident has suggested installing chicanes; however, it is thought that the road is too narrow, Cllr Cusack suggested speed bumps. It was decided that the Councillors should give this matter some thought and for an article to be published in the parish newsletter to gauge reaction in the village.




