Village Hall update

If you haven't been in the Village Hall lately you might not know the Committee have been busy over the summer organising some more improvements – the main hall has been redecorated and blinds put in place of the old curtains. New blinds were also fitted in the kitchen

and committee room. The gents toilet has an upgraded system and the fire alarm extended to be heard more clearly in the disabled toilet at the back. (recommended at the fire inspection)





Middleton WI News

At our September meeting we welcomed Luke Fitzgerald, Master Thatcher to speak to us about his craft. Luke brought with him his thatching tools and materials, his materials being long straw and water reed. In other parts of the country it might be sedge, rushes, heather or whatever is most abundant. Luke explained his interest in thatching started as a boy. He went from apprentice (2-3 years preparing straw and carrying) to



journeyman (5-10 years learning the craft) to master thatcher (awarded after an independent skill assessment by the East Anglian Master Thatchers Association) Luke has been thatching for 16 years.

The long straw is obtained from an old variety of wheat using an old temperamental threshing machine to preserve the straw. The straw is bundled by hand. A small flat bundle is cut to the length required, a straw rake cleans the surface.



The strands should all be even and running in the same direction, the ends are hit with a leggit (a ridged plate with a handle) to make them flush. The bundle is secured to the roof with a raunch made out of a stick of split hazel bent into a u shape. The raunch is hit with a mallet to fix it into place. Hazel was the traditional fixing material but now hooks and wires are also used. The layering of the straw helps to shed water away from the inner roof and traps pockets of air for insulation. The ridging at the top keeps it all together and can be varied in patterns and designs. These days the thatch is wrapped in chicken wire for protection against rodents and birds. Mosses and lichens may grow on the surface but the thatch will be bone dry underneath. The life span of a thatched roof depends on the skill of the thatcher. If well done a reed thatch will last 60 years and a long straw 45 to 50. The ridge though will have to be replaced after 15-20 years. We found Luke's talk very informative and interesting. He told us this was the first time he had given such a talk. We were impressed!

Our November meeting will be on Wednesday the 16th at 7:15 at the village hall. The talk will be "Her Infinite Variety" Simon Bridge (Shakespeare Globe Theatre) All welcome.

November Nature Notes

The arrival of fieldfares and redwings each autumn is an important landmark in nature's calendar and herald of winter. The depletion of the rowan crop triggers millions of these northern thrushes leave their frozen breeding areas to spend winter in the relative warmth of the British countryside. Here they head for hedgerows rich in berries, particularly, hawthorn, dog-rose and holly. Later in the winter they will congregate in open fields and pasture to feed on soil invertebrates. Though, during periods of cold weather, when food in the hedgerows becomes scarce, these birds are attracted into gardens to feed on berries or fallen fruit. This often gives us a good opportunity to observe at close quarters these attractive birds from the warmth our houses.

Larger than blackbirds, fieldfares are strikingly marked, with a pale grey head and rump, chestnut back, heavily speckled buffy-yellow breast and silvery-white underwings and, in more mature adults, a peachy colouring down either side. However, they will soon give away their presence with their harsh and loud chacking calls. Redwings are similar to our resident song thrushes as they are a more uniform brown with a spotted breast but with a striking white eye stripe and a large patch of rufous-chestnut across the whole of the underwing coverts, which is only visible in flight. This spectacular blaze of colour is where this the redwing's name is derived. The call, always given in flight is a long drawn out 'zeeep', which can be heard as birds are frightened from cover or atmospherically when on clear autumn evenings as hundreds of redwings make their migration south. The name fieldfare is from the Anglo-Saxon meaning field traveller.





Birds from the far northern forests have little contact with man and can exhibit remarkable tameness. This is particularly so with fieldfares which with care can be approached quite closely, whereas redwings at the first sign of danger will tend to retreat to the nearest trees. Both these species are highly nomadic and move according to food supply and weather conditions; hard frosts and snow will push them further west, until the birds start to make the reverse journey as the weather becomes milder in late winter. But here on the east coast it is not until late April or early May when the last birds leave to head back to their breeding territories. Indeed, large flocks of these northern thrushes can still be seen feeding on arable fields well into spring as the birds wait for suitable weather conditions to return to their breeding areas of Scandinavia and central and northern Russia.

MINUTES OF THE MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY 11th OCTOBER 2022 AT 7:00 PM AT THE VILLAGE HALL

1. Attendance and Apologies

2. Councillors' Declarations of Interest

3. Public Forum

a) District Cllr. Tom Daly summarised the monthly ESC report. Highlights include a funding boost of £2.5 million from central government over three years to end rough sleeping in the district and there is a call for more homes for Ukranian refugees. Cllr. Daly outlined the Ease the Squeeze initiative and informed the Council of the Leiston town centre masterplan consultation.

b) District Cllr. Russ Rainger informed the Council about a supplementary planning document consultation about designing developments which better support health and wellbeing.

c) With reference to the Ease the Squeeze initiative, the Chairman informed the District Councillors about the Council's intention to resume the Drop-In Centre at the Village Hall for elderly and isolated residents from now until the end of the year. The Council accepted Cllr. Lesley Taylor's previously circulated suggestions to begin warming the hall earlier, to start slightly later and to extend the session through to an early lunch serving not only tea/coffee and cake but also the option of hot, homemade soup and a roll. Cllr. Taylor wrote that there are some funds leftover from last year's grant but she hoped the warm room and lunch would qualify the service to apply for an Ease the Squeeze grant which would cover the increased energy costs. District Cllr. Russ Rainger replied that the Council should apply for funding from the scheme and he would check his remaining Enabling Communities Budget.

d) County Cllr. Richard Smith reported that the Judicial Review led by Together Against Sizewell C, and supported by Stop Sizewell C, has been accepted by the court but a date for the hearing has not yet been announced. A second Judicial Review was submitted by RSPB but this was rejected by the court as it was lodged one day late. Cllr. Smith said that if the Judicial Review fails, EDF will progress its Final Investment Decision which is more likely to need £30 billion than the £20 billion previously stated. If funds are secured, EDF aim to start by summer 2023 which will be the start of misery for many communities. Cllr. Smith said he will work hard to get as much community compensation as he can.

County Cllr. Smith reported that next financial year's budget will be for £625 million with £58 million alone due to inflation. The County has until February 2023 to present a balanced budget and there will be tough decisions made to get there.

In response to a question from the Chairman, Cllr. Smith said he did not have any information about Investment Zones but he will attend a briefing tomorrow and will give a more detailed report next month.

e) Luca Riccio, the Regional Sales Manager from County Broadband briefed the Council about the fibre-to-premises project proposed for the parish. The infrastructure surveys will be completed by the end of the month and testing will begin in November. They have reached the minimum threshold of residents signed up to make the project viable so they intend to proceed. They need another 20 or 30 households to sign up but they have no concerns about reaching that number. There will be additional fees if households do not sign up at this pre-stage. As a gesture of giving back to the community, Mr Riccio said that County Broadband provides a free connection for Village Halls. They also offer a grant scheme called Hypercharge Foundation which may provide funding for the Drop-In Centre. In response to a question from Cllr. Graham Lacey, Mr Riccio confirmed that the scheme is proposed for all of the outlying areas within the parish boundary, not just the village centre and to properties with short driveways.

ACTION: Clerk to provide contact details for the Village Hall Management Committee.

4. Minutes

The Council approved as accurate the minutes of the meeting held on 12th July 2022.

5. Casual Vacancies

No applications were received.

6. Councillors' and Clerk's Reports

a) Sizewell C – the Chairman informed the Council that the first meeting of the B1122 Working Group is scheduled for 18th October. The Chairman, Cllr. Lesley Taylor, Cllr. Lynda Whitbread and Cllr. Steve Thorpe will attend. The B1125, between Rackford Bridge and the B1122, will be included in the discussion.

b) Highways/Footpaths – Cllr. Graham Lacey reported that he forwarded a pack of reports and photographs of the flooding in Fordley Road to County Cllr. Richard Smith.

c) Village Hall – the Clerk reported that the Saxmundham Sub-Postmaster declined the request for an Outreach Post Office service due to high cost of installing the equipment and the perceived low demand.

d) Primary School – the Council noted that the school is recruiting for a new Head Teacher next term.

e) Hastoe Housing – the Chairman informed the Council that he is unable to attend the rescheduled opening event on 21st October, however past Chairman, Nigel Smith, who was instrumental in delivering the housing would attend as the parish representative and say a few words. It was noted that Hastoe had improved the landscaping in time for the event.

f) Middleton Moor – the Chairman reported that Natural England may offer an extension to the current Stewardship Agreement for three years in December. He said the updated SWT Management Report will prove timely as evidence that the Moor has been managed in accordance with the terms of the agreement.

g) Ease the Squeeze – Cllr. Lynda Whitbread reported that she attended this informative briefing from the District Council. It was agreed to circulate information in the newsletter and noticeboards.

h) Outstanding Actions List – the Council reviewed and updated the list.

7. Parish Matters

a) The Council considered Cllr. Steve Thorpe's previously circulated note that residents have reported that the amount of dog fouling on the footpaths increases during the holiday season. The Council accepted Cllr. Thorpe's suggestion to request that holiday lettings include a reminder in their information pack for dog owners to use bags and bins provided and to provide them with a map of the location of dog bins. ACTION: Cllr. Steve Thorpe to progress.

b) The Council authorised the service and repair of the brushcutter used by the Summer Wine Group.

8. Public Forum Resumed

Bryony Peall from the IP17 Good Neighbours Scheme briefed the Council about the ways the scheme could assist Middleton cum Fordley residents during the cost of living crisis. ACTION: Clerk to forward Cllr. Lesley Taylor's contact details to Ms Peall.

9. Administration

a) The Council agreed to defer the strategic objectives meeting until after the election in May 2023.

b) The Council conducted the annual review of the insurance policy and ensured the terms of the policy remain acceptable and that all known risks and assets are adequately protected. The Chairman queried why the sum of £60,000 was shown as insurance for buildings. ACTION: Clerk to contact the insurance provider.

10. Finance

a) The Council noted the latest financial position, including receipts, and verified last month's approved payments.

b) The Council agreed a donation of £35 to the Royal British Legion for a poppy wreath.

ACTION: Cllr. Chris Reynolds to provide the Clerk with payment details.

c) The Council ratified the following payments which were made during the period of National Mourning:
