As the 80th anniversary of VE Day is on 8th May, the Community Council are joining with the nation and entering into the spirit with a Middleton Street Party, similar to those across the realm 80 years ago.

The war continued in the Far East until Japan surrendered on 15th of August 1945 (VJ Day), but Britain did celebrate the end of the war in Europe with parties, bonfires, music, dancing, sports and singing.



As you can see from this photograph of the Middleton folk of 1945, speedy celebration attire was created along with the food to share. It was reported that on Cornhill, there was a great and colourful crowd ready to hear Churchill's announcement. In Framlingham, residents dressed up to represent different nations, other villagers wore their Sunday best or quickly created party hats or fancy dress, Saxmundham was "well beflagged" and bunting bedecked towns and villages across Suffolk.

Go that extra mile and try a new hair style - maybe even a Victory roll! Or come dressed in patriotic **red**, white and blue. However you choose, all are welcome to come along & join in.



Nature Notes

Anyone who has gazed into a garden pond cannot have failed to notice a number of small beetles swimming on the surface, which when alarmed start to swim rapidly in circles; these are, for this reason, commonly known as whirligig beetles. In spring adults start to appear after overwintering below the surface, clinging to vegetation.



Whirligig beetles belong to the family Gyrinidae. There are twelve species known from Britain, but only six from Suffolk, and of these the common whirligig *Gyrinus substriatus* is by far the most common, occurring on almost any man-made pond or ditch. Other species have more specialised habitat requirements. Most species are very similar in general appearance, although varying in size from 3.5mm to 8mm in length depending on species. They tend to be flattened and rounded in cross section and ellipsoidal in plan, with the legs fitting closely to the streamlined surface. The middle, and hind, legs are adapted for swimming; they are greatly flattened - paddle like and fringed with bristles that fold to aid swimming action. In contrast the front legs are long and adapted for grasping food or prey; food for whirligig beetles being floating detritus, or struggling insects that have fallen in.

The surface swimming behaviour of whirligig beetles appears to make them vulnerable to predation, but they have evolved a number of strategies to prevent capture. To help detect potential predators from above and below whirligigs have four eyes, two looking up and two down; the top eyes are normal, but the bottom ones are large, presumably to detect movement in the weaker light underwater. They also give off a strong odour which is toxic to fish and amphibians, and which make them spew out any whirligigs they happen to swallow. Whirligig beetles are gregarious, forming large rafts, which when disturbed turns into a swerving mass, in an attempt to mesmerise a potential enemy. It is thought that larger groups of whirligig beetles detect approaching predators sooner than smaller groups because there is a greater probability that at least one beetle in the group will see the predator (the many eyes hypothesis). However, their most impressive survival strategy is their high speed manoeuvrability and rapid gyrations, achieving sudden accelerations greater than any aquatic insect. Whirligigs also can fly well, even taking off from water if need be, this can be to

avoid predation, find a mate, or to colonise new ponds. Their life cycle is quite simple, eggs are laid in early summer with larvae hatching within two weeks. They live in deep water until it is time to pupate, when they climb on a plant growing well above the surface and form a cocoon. Adults emerge in late summer, when 'schools' of many hundreds if not thousands of individuals can be observed together. Peter Vincent



Middleton Dark Skies

<u>May Highlights</u>


Planets on view. Venus will be a brilliant object in the pre-dawn sky out towards the East. It will have **Saturn** close by all month. They both rise at around 4 AM at the beginning of the month, with Saturn being first up towards the end of the month. If you are up at that %me, a good pair of binoculars and a steady hand will show Saturn as a slight ellipse, due to the angle of its rings. **Jupiter**, s%ll in Taurus, and **Mars**, now in Cancer, are s%ll visible in the NW sky ajer sunset. Jupiter is fading now as it gets further away from the Earth and sets around 11 PM. Mars sets some three hours later.

ConstellaXons. The constella%on of **Boötes** is front and center in the Southern sky this month. It is one of the largest constella%ons in the northern hemisphere, with its four brightest stars forming a dis%nc%ve 'kite; shape. The name Boötes comes from the Greek word Boötës, meaning, upon other things, Herdsman. It contains the third brightest star in the night sky, Arcturus. Five of the stars that make up the constella%on have been found to have planets orbi%ng them. **Ursa Major** and **Ursa Minor**, The Great and Li8le Bears respec%vely, remain overhead this month, and as always, are well worth looking out for

The Moon Known as The Flower Moon this month, ajer the emerging spring flowers. It is also known as Hare Moon, Mothers Moon and Corn Plan%ng Moon. Full Moon occurs on the 12th this month. On the 3rd, the Moon will be posi%oned just above Mars, while on 23rd, in the pre-dawn sky, the Moon will be signg between Venus and Saturn.

<u>Meteors</u> The Eta Aquarid shower reaches it peak in the early hours of the 6th, but unfortunately is all but washed out by a bright Moon.

<u>ArXficial Satellites</u>. Plenty of these to see, just stand out for 30 mins or so and you should be able to spot several moving across the sky. They usually move from the West to the East, but there are also several that move South to North. Some satellites move in small groups or in a line, so always fun to watch out for these. It's also worth checking out on line when the Space Sta%on will be overhead.

SHAME UPON SZC!

AN AREA OF OUTSTANDING BEAUTY HAS BEEN SWAPPED FOR AN AREA OF OUTSTANDING UGLINESS

Those living in Middleton and its environs knew that once prepara%on for SZC started, there would be disturbance and upset to people and the environment. However, nothing could have prepared them for the mindless devasta%on that has followed the mere beginning of this enormous project. Power sta%on workers have hacked down more than 25,000 trees in a once beau%ful area and that figure con%nues to rise at a most alarming rate. Areas enclosed by steel rail mesh fencing did need to lose some trees, but SZC has gone much further than this. Trees and hedges well outside the boundaries of the fencing have been chopped down and grubbed out. So much for SZC regarding itself as a 'green' company.

Perhaps one good thing may follow - we may learn be8er to appreciate and cherish some magnificent trees that remain. In the Middleton area there is an oak tree which is more than 1000 years old. What a tribute to its stubborn tenacity for life and its indifference to humans. At the top of The Causeway there is an enormous holly tree that, judging by its girth, is at least 100 years old. By early December, it is covered with bright red berries, but for those aspiring to borrow a twig or two for the fes%ve season bad luck follows. On or about 10th December a flock of redwings will appear and pinch all the berries. Good for them, as the seeds these birds drop are set to con%nue the family line. Apart from insects making the holly tree their home, a tawny owl ojen perches in the branches keeping a beady eye on the road below. Surprisingly, an enterprising badger has started a set adjacent to this tree. A trail of sand stretches across the road and he has been seen troopng along it late at night. Possibly he is seeking fallen apples in the adjacent orchard.

Between Middleton and the coast, mountains of sand have been raised up by mighty bulldozers. With trees now missing, the sand will be blown away to produce sand hills and dunes elsewhere. We are told that all this will help to make us 'greener', but it is quite possible that exactly the opposite will be achieved. Many will recall their primary school teachers explaining that deserts are caused by mindless deforesta%on.

WI April Meeting News

We welcomed David Naylor from RSPB Minsmere. In 2020 David retired and moved from Derbyshire to Suffolk. He was always a keen birdwatcher and amateur photographer which led him to become a volunteer at Minsmere. Over the years he has carried out surveys of bird migrations, numbers, species and nesting places, observed the weather effects on the reserve and monitored the mammals and reptiles living there. He gives guided walking tours and is now going out and giving talks to interested groups (like WI's). He uses his own photos of the birds, wildlife and Minsmere landscapes to illustrate his talks. The RSPB came about in 1889 when 2 women's groups, The Plumage League and The Fin, Fur and Feather Folk, campaigned to stop the use of animal fur, skins and bird feathers in the fashion industry. RSPB Minsmere was founded in 1947 on 2,500 acres of land rented from the local Ogilvie family who could see the terrain was a special place for migrating and nesting birds. A few decades later the RSPB was able to purchase the land. Minsmere has distinct areas of habitat: reed-beds/meres, the River Minsmere, lowland heath and heather, woodland, and acid grassland. These areas sustain a wide diversity of wildlife. The reed-beds are home to bitterns, bearded tits, great crested grebes (hunted for their feathers), water voles and otters. Lowland heath, woodland and grassland support nightjars, nightingales, stone curlews, dartford warblers, red deer, badgers, muntjacs, red fox and stoats. Soaring above Minsmere can now be seen the Marsh Harrier which has reappeared after the use of DDT was banned. In the spring and autumn there are migrating birds on their way to and from Africa. In the near future David told us, there is a good chance that the osprey and the white tailed sea eagle will become residents in our reserve. Both have been reintroduced to southern England. Rita thanked David for his very interesting talk and his stunning photos, one of which had been chosen for The Country File Calendar! LV

This year we played in Division 1 against four other teams, all local to Middleton so not too much travelling!


We managed to win five of our eight matches and ended up in second place with a total of fourteen points.


Coffee at The Bell

Work across all Sizewell C sites continues to progress at pace.

At Friday Street, a works compound has been created on the car boot sale field. The car boot sale is not affected by this. The next steps involve establishing the Friday Street site, including necessary vegetation and tree removal, overseen by an ecological clerk of works to ensure the protection of nesting birds. This activity will be visible from the A12 when travelling to or from Stratford St Andrew and Farnham village.

The Friday Street roundabout will connect the new two- village bypass around Stratford St Andrew and Farnham to the A12. Preparation for the bypass construction includes further vegetation clearance and tree removal, with Heras fencing being installed along the site boundary.

Railway works in and around Leiston are also progressing. Vegetation and some trees have been removed to create space for track reconstruction and overall operational improvements. Work to upgrade the area's level crossings is ongoing, with surveys underway to assess requirements.

Earthworks at the Yoxford roundabout will begin later this month, starting away from the A12 to ensure no disruption to the road.

At the Northern Park and Ride site, vegetation clearance is complete, and archaeological investigations continue. Archaeology at the Southern Park and Ride is ongoing and expected to conclude in autumn. As areas are cleared, phased construction will begin this summer. Work to realign BT Openreach network wires along the slip road is also ongoing and expected to continue until the end of May.

- 2. Councillors' Declarations of Interest. Cllr Macdowell declared an interest relating to Planning Applications DC/25/1101 and 1102/FUL.
- 3. **Public Forum** Discontent was voiced over the pond works recently carried out, although it was acknowledged that the water has been 'opened up' (a condition of the grant) and that the work has provided evidence/information on how to proceed next.

Significant damage to the road verges, by SZC traffic, was also reported. Action: Cllr Macdowell to report this to SZC.

Cllr Macdowell confirmed, upon enquiry, that the SLR will be open Summer 2027.

4. Minutes

The Council approved the minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 12 March 2025.

- * No dog fouling signs were handed to Cllr Macdowell for instalation.
- * The village green is being cut.

5. Causeway Farm

An application to the SZC Community Fund has been drafted and shared with Sarah Mortimer (Fund Project Manager), the PC are currently awaiting feedback. It was agreed to submit the application (for either the 20 April deadline or the following 20 July deadline), in order to keep options open, but no decision to proceed will be made until after further consultation with residents.

Correspondence voicing concerns regarding the possibility of a Community Park at Hastoe Field has been received from some residents. The issues raised were discussed, with responses as follows:

No clear mandate. The meeting was widely publicised, with most attendees in favour of the project. Only a small amount of direct feedback was received via the village newsletter and village website. Twenty three out of the 40 attendees replied positively to the survey handed out at the end of the meeting. It was agreed that opinion is divided but the PC will continue to progress as planned.

Alternatives? We are limited by SZC guidelines and what their Community Fund will approve. The focus must very much be on mitigating the impact of SZC on the community. Although, it was noted that alternatives could be pursued through other grant opportunities.

Maintenance Costs. The SZC grant, if approved, will provide three years' worth of payments, therefore it will be beyond these three years that revenue funding will be required. Below is an example of what may be required:

A provisional estimate of £8,530 per annum for the employment of a grounds person one day per week and equipment hire was discussed. This would, it is hoped, be partially offset by other funding but if entirely added to the precept, it would represent approx. 69p per week extra, per Band D (average) household. It was noted that current maintenance of the pavilion and playing field costs fall partly on the precept.

Action: Cllr Cusack to respond to residents' email. Action: Cllrs Cusack, Piercy and Thorpe to meet to discuss next steps.

6. Sizewell C and other Energy Projects. Cllr Macdowell reported back on Lion Link.

- Footprint measures 30 metres wide. Cables buried 2 metres down. For the crossing of rivers, streams, roads and railways the cables will be buried 6 metres down.
- It is anticipated that works will be completed in a single season.
- Currently in the consultation phase (ending at the end of this year).
- DCO will be submitted to the Government in October 2026.
- Build will take place 2029/30.
- A haul road will run alongside and within the 30-metre gap, for two years.

A member of the public attended the recent meeting in Saxmundham and advised that Lion Link staff were unable to answer questions put to them.

The meeting was advised that vegetation must not be planted where the cables run.

It was agreed that the PC should be represented at the Lion Link public enquiry.

A bullet point recap of the SZC Community Forum on 27 March was supplied to the Councillors by the Clerk. Questions were raised as to whether 26,000 trees have been planted and if so, where? Action: Clerk to seek clarity from SZC.

A request was made by a member of the public that MPC arrange a public meeting for Middleton residents with SZC to discuss the multiple areas of devastation, this was agreed by the PC if SZC agree to organise/ chair/publicise and fund), although with limited expectation that anything positive will be achieved. Action: Cllr Macdowell to liaise with SZC.

Cllr Lacey has written to SZC regarding yet more destruction of hedgerows along Fordley Road and poorly placed temporary traffic stoppage notices. Prior notice of the works was not provided to residents. Cllr Cusack also contacted SZC regarding this road closure and the inadequate signage. The average time for SZC to reply is 4/5 days. Action: Cllr Macdowell to share Cllr Lacey's email with other SZC contacts.

Cllr Macdowell reported back on the latest Main Development Site Forum.

- Average speed cameras due by the end of June.
- Electronic warning sign on Mill Lane junction with B1122 due by the end of June.
- Between August and October Leiston Station Road level crossing will be closed for 18 days.
- A new grant fund, East Suffolk Trust Fund, will be opening for bids next Spring.
- Via a zoom meeting, a member of staff from Hinkley shared problems that have been experienced including light pollution, an increase of workforce from an original figure of 6,000 to 12,000, with 500 employees a week going through induction. A large percentage of workers are not local. The extra workforce is causing feeding and sewage issues. Traffic is a problem, with fly parking a big issue. Negative impact on local rental market. The change to a unitary authority in Somerset has proved unhelpful with the loss of many Hinkley experts. There is a big nighttime economy with fast food joints that are doing well. They now have their own health and police set up. Spent fuel will be stored on site (60 years' worth).
