OPEN GARDENS

Earlier this summer my family was able to enjoy the beauty of Holy Trinity Church, as our son married his fiancé. During this time, many of you shared your stories of why this Church had such special memories for you; so, it was good to see the village come together to raise money through the Open Gardens weekend to enable us to continue to care for this valued building.



The PCC appreciates its role as custodians of this wonderful building, and will continue to work with the wider community to care for the building and preserve it for all those who live in the Village. We were overwhelmed by your warm-hearted generosity, enthusiastic commitment, and hard work over the two days, and I am pleased to report that another record was achieved as £5,230 was raised, so far, from the event.

15% of the money raised, at least £785, will be given to a local critical care charity, the Suffolk Accident Response Service, to improve emergency physical health interventions across Suffolk, including this rural area. Their volunteer responders and critical care teams aim to assist the ambulance service at serious medical emergencies and trauma; they can provide life-saving equipment, not always available on frontline ambulances.

A further 5%, at least £262, will be used to benefit the village, and this year the Village Hall will benefit from a professional clearing of weeds in the car park and general tidy up.

Then money that comes to the church from the Open Gardens, after the expenses are taken out, will all be used to maintain the fabric of the building, and to ensure it is here for future generations; currently this stands at £3,388. Over the last two decades over 300 parish churches have closed, so it is a credit to this village community that we are able to keep the church open for some of life's important and meaningful occasions.

Thank you to all those who opened their gardens, big and small, all inspiring; thank you to all those who helped and worked hard to make the event such a success, with such warm heartedness; and thank you to those who attended and took part to make this event flourish. Let it grow.... let it blossom, let it flow.




Macmillan Coffee Morning



September Nature Notes

As summer turns to autumn and the evenings begin to draw-in our open and lighted windows are attractive to a number of insects. One of the most frequent indoor visitors are craneflies, commonly known as "daddy-long-legs" and in Suffolk as Michaelmas gnats - an appropriate name given the time of year and their general gnat-like appearance. However, craneflies belong to a distinctive group of diptera (true flies) known as the Tipuloidea, characterised by slender abdomens, long antennae and very long spindly legs which are so slightly attached that it is difficult to capture one without breaking one off.

There are 322 British cranefly species, of four families, ranging in size from a couple of millimetres to the largest Tipula maxima which has a leg span of over 100mm, while Tipula paludosa the species most commonly found indoors in the autumn is still quite large with a wing span of about 40mm. Many smaller species of craneflies are frequently mistaken for mosquitoes but they differ entirely in habits and can be distinguished from mosquitoes by the lack of scales on the wing veins and having non-piercing mouth parts so are incapable of biting. However, the female abdomen does end in a pointed ovipositor that may look somewhat like a stinger, but is completely harmless; the male abdomen is blunt ended.



Adult craneflies are short lived and do not need to feed much, but they can suck up water and nectar from flowers. However, once they become adults, feeding is not important but finding a mate is, and once a male cranefly emerges from its pupal case their first task is to search for a female to which to mate. Following mating the female deposits eggs by inserting her pointed abdomen into the soil, depositing one egg on each hop as she bounce across the surface of the soil. Mating and egg laying usually takes place within twenty four hours of emergence. The eggs hatch into larvae. Many species live in most soil or rotting wood and the larvae eat decomposing plants and other microscopic organisms associated with organic matter. Some cranefly larvae live in water and have gills. They are predators of other small invertebrates or feed on algae and moss. Most craneflies are important recyclers of organic material, but a few attack living plants and can be pests. These are the larvae of terrestrial craneflies, commonly known as 'leather jackets', and get themselves a bad name from gardeners and farmers by feeding on the root systems of grasses and cereal crops and by burrowing into potato tubers.

New Homes for Swifts in Middleton



The Suffolk Coast and Heaths AONB is thrilled to have received some funding from the Galloper Wind Farm Fund to help pay for swift boxes and callers to be installed on suitable buildings in Middleton, Leiston and Thorpeness.

18 boxes and 3 callers are allocated for Middleton with more for Leiston and Thorpeness. However, flexibility on this allocation means that more might be available for Middleton if there is demand.

Swifts have declined by an alarming 50% over the last twenty years and as a result they have been identified as a priority species within the Suffolk Coast and Heaths AONB Nature Recovery Plan. Although the swift is currently an Amber Listed Bird of Conservation Concern its rate of decline strongly suggests it should be considered as being on the Red List in the UK which is the highest level of conservation concern. The sharp decline it has experienced is mainly due to the loss of nest sites from buildings in towns and villages. Despite sharing our buildings for over 2,000 years, new building techniques and materials in addition to insulation of older buildings are preventing them from nesting. As buildings are replaced, insulated or repaired, swifts find themselves excluded, and they are now declining fast.

The AONB would love to hear from you if you know of a suitable site for installing swift boxes. Suitable places for swift boxes include:

- Under eaves
- On or in gables or high walls
- Height above ground should be at least 4.5 metres

Unsuitable places include:

- X Very exposed, cold, wet or hot positions (unless insulated or sheltered)
- X Very close to trees, tall vegetation, ladders, handrails or cables. These can provide perches for predators and can also impede the swifts flight access.
- X Height above ground below 4.5 metres.

In order to nominate a suitable location for nest box installation please email a photograph of the proposed site to the AONB's Nature Recovery Officer (Alex Moore da Luz) at alex.mooredaluz@suffolk.gov.uk

Please note the AONB cannot install the boxes for you. Recipients of the boxes need to arrange the safe installation of boxes themselves in order to be considered for the scheme.


