Music video brings Ipswich churches together



Dozens of people from churches across Ipswich have come together to sing a song about unity and hope.

Members of 43 Christian church denominations have recorded themselves singing along to the song The Blessing by Elevation Worship. Performers involved included members of Hope Church Ipswich, Rushmere Baptist Church, Trinity Praise Centre, Waterfront Churches and Holly Lodge Baptist Church, among many more.

The project was organised by the Revd Amy Key and her husband Matt, of St Augustine's Church in Ipswich, and aims to bring hope and

comfort to the community during the coronavirus lockdown. Matt, who previously worked in music production, said: "We were hugely inspired by The UK Blessing which quickly went viral. It has had more than three million views. There was lots of talk about churches working together and being there for their community, so we thought it would be wonderful to replicate it in Ipswich as a message of hope to our town's residents."

The pair contacted more than 60 church leaders, representing 75 churches of all denominations across Ipswich, to put forward a representative to sing a part of the song which was then edited into one single video. Bishop Mike said: "*It's entirely right, good and proper that as churches we come together to bless Ipswich, truly seeking the good of Ipswich and its people in God's strength.*"

Leadership in Lockdown Webinar (2) - Rhythms, Rest and Focus Wednesday 17 June 10.00am

Our immediate response to lockdown is done, but what now as we face ongoing uncertainties? It is increasingly likely that we are going to be in some form of lockdown for a long time. The constantly changing nature of our situation means it is hard work to keep pivoting as new scenarios unfold, and we may struggle with energy and motivation. In this interactive webinar we will explore how to find new rhythms, embrace rest (including what to do about holidays) and identify three things we can do to keep going and keep focused for the long haul. Our speaker is James Lawrence, Leadership Principal at CPAS, who is conducting a series of webinars around the country. He teaches and trains on issues of leadership and mission. And just like you, he is finding this season a heady-mix of challenge and opportunity.

2019 Return of Parish Finance and Annual Accounts Thank you to everyone who has completed their return, either directly into the online portal or by email. However, the return rate has been significantly affected by COVID-19 restrictions, and to date the national church have only received 27% of all returns compared with 47% at this time last year. As such the deadline has now been extended to 31 July 2020. Please could you ensure that your parishes submit their returns as soon as figures are ready via https://parishreturns.churchofengland.org (the preferred method) or by email to dbf@cofesuffolk.org.

Copies of annual accounts and reports should also be emailed to <u>dbf@cofesuffolk.org</u> at the earliest opportunity please.

Your Return of Parish Finance should agree with the figures in your accounts, and the accounts should be independently examined. However, if the returns and accounts have both been prepared, and the accounts are ready to be examined, please submit the returns before the deadline if independent examination is likely to be significantly delayed. There is also no need to wait for the APCM before submitting the returns. The PCC should approve the accounts on which the returns are based. However, to avoid delay caused by the lockdown, the accounts can be approved at an online meeting of the PCC or be recommended for approval by the Finance or Standing Committee.

Parish Giving Scheme If you currently access your monthly PGS statements online, via their website – please take note of the following information: The PGS are currently in the process of developing a new website – which will offer improved functionality, as well as a fresh and modern design, for both donors and statement receivers.

The next step in the development process is for statement receivers to begin accessing their monthly statements via the new site. It is important to note that any monthly statements held on the existing website (i.e. prior to June 2020) WILL NOT be carried over to the new site. Therefore, if you have not yet downloaded your monthly statements from December 2019 – May 2020 (inclusive), you will need to do so no later than Friday 5 June 2020.
