was held in Holy Trinity, Middleton on 28th November.

Andy Wood's talk about Adnams

Even for those of us who may already know something of Adnams' history this was a fascinating talk. Andy had a fluid, conversational style and barely needed to refer to his notes. He took us through both the story of Adnams within the context of brewing in Southwold from 1345 up to the present day and also explained his own background and how he came to be the CEO of the company.

It was a compelling tale. The original "Ale Wife" founder of brewing at the Swan Hotel site in Southwold, Johanna de Corby, whose low-strength beers were able to take the pathogens out of the local water allowing workers to drink well and not get too intoxicated, ended up in jail after prosecutions from the weights and measures authorities.

We moved on in time to 1672 and The Battle of Sole Bay, the third of the Anglo-Dutch trade wars that resulted in 3000 dead on both sides!

Ten years later, the "party" ship, HMS Gloucester, linked to this battle, ran aground off Great Yarmouth and sank but King James II who was on board, and had been Lord High Admiral in the battle of Sole Bay managed to disembark.

Two diver brothers who explored the wreck in 2007, Julian and Lincoln Barnwell discovered a huge haul of 20,000 artefacts. Andy recommended an exhibition of these objects at Norwich Castle running from February to July next year.

Andy then recounted how the company called Adnams, developed from 1872, when it was founded, to 1902, when the Loftus family became majority shareholders, to consolidation in the 20th century. CAMRA's praise for this local brewery and shares on the Stockmarket led to Adnams' prime reputation today.

Andy, who had moved from Lewisham to Loddon as a youth, was employed by Norwich Union in its "halcyon days" where he was 'educated' and looked after as a new recruit. When he decided to work for Adnams he pursued further education and achieved a doctorate at Cranfield.

In 25 years at Adnams Andy has overseen many changes, particularly in brand development and sustainability. The motto: "Real Beer from a Real Place made by Real People" governs all the company's vision. The business wants to be a force for good and takes its responsibilities seriously, aiming to acquire more properties and still remain independent.

At our November meeting we welcomed Simon Bridge from Shakespeare's Globe Theatre who gave us a talk "Her Infinite Variety". Simon has been an actor for 27 years and since 1993 has been in the education wing of the Globe Theatre giving lectures and conducting workshops for students. He explained the Globe is a reconstruction of the original from Shakespeare's time. No one knew for sure how plays were staged in Shakespeare's time 300 years ago, so it was a matter of trial and error on how to use this new one. They worked it out as they went. Simon reminded us that in Shakespeare's day there were no actresses, boys played the female roles. In 1629 an acting company from France came to give a play and they used women in the cast. The audience "pippin pelted" them (threw apples)! Shakespeare was a shareholder in the Company and knew all the actors. He wrote plays with certain actors in mind for the roles. The female roles played by boys but in some of his plays he had the women dressing as men such as Portia in "The Merchant of Venice". Shakespeare used the poetic device of metaphors in his plays to make his characters and audiences feel emotions. To demonstrate this, Simon used his favorite device of audience participation: he had us do the balcony scene from "Romeo and Juliet" with half of us playing Juliet standing on the balcony and the other half sitting to represent Romeo on the ground. Simon read out the lines and we shouted them out in some sort of unison. We had a good laugh and thanked Simon for a very entertaining 45 minutes!

Our AGM followed tea. We heard the annual reports from the president and treasurer. We re-elected Lynda as president and welcomed Angela on to the committee as secretary.

December Nature Notes

The plants traditionally associated with Christmas - holly, ivy, mistletoe, yew - have had special roles in ancient religions and past cultures. Some early religions had midwinter festivals to celebrate the return of the sun following the shortest day. The winter solstice was also the start of the Roman festival of Saturnalia when houses were decorated with evergreens. When this festival was absorbed into the Christian calendar, like other evergreens, branches of yew were brought into people's homes at Christmas as decoration.

Yew trees are associated with churchyards, indeed many churchyards in England contain yew trees older than the church buildings themselves. It is not clear why yews were planted near churches. There is a connection to the Old Norse and Celtic beliefs that yew trees protected against bewitchment and death, and also that yew trees were planted on the graves of plague victims to protect and purify the dead. Perhaps more prosaically they were planted to stop 'commoners' from grazing their cattle on church ground as yew is extremely poisonous to livestock. The story that they were planted to ensure a ready supply of material for longbow manufacture is considered to be a myth.

Yew, *Taxus baccata* is a small to medium-sized evergreen tree, growing 10-20 metres with a trunk up to two metres diameter. It has thin, scaly brown bark and flat, dark green leaves. All parts of the tree contain highly poisonous taxine alkaloids, the toxicity increasing in potency when wilted or dried. The seed cones each contain a single seed partly surrounded by a modified scale which develops into a soft, bright red berry-like open ended structure called an aril. The arils mature six to nine months after pollination, the seed contained are eaten by birds, which disperse the hard seeds undamaged in their droppings. The seeds themselves are extremely poisonous, but are opened and eaten by birds, particularly by hawfinches, greenfinches and great tits. The aril itself is not poisonous, and is gelatinous and sweet tasting.



Yew can reach 400 to 600 years of age. Some specimens live longer but the age of yews is often overestimated. It is impossible to determine the age of yews accurately and is subject to much dispute. There is rarely any wood as old as the entire tree, while the boughs themselves often become hollow with age, making ring counts impossible. There are claims as high as 9000 years, but other evidence based on growth rates and archaeological investigations suggests the oldest trees are more likely to be around 2,000 years. Even with this lower estimate, yew is one of the longest-living plants in Europe. One characteristic contributing to its longevity is that it is able to split under the weight of advanced growth without succumbing to disease in the fracture, as do most other trees. Another is its ability to give rise to new epicormic and basal shoots from cut surfaces and low on its trunk, even at an old age.

Celebrating the opening of Roke Drive

The new housing development by Hastoe at Roke Drive was officially opened on 21 October 2022, with one of the new residents cutting the ribbon.

The scheme comprises: a terrace of three social-rented houses; a pair of semidetached, shared equity bungalows; an open-market detached house; and two self-build plots for detached houses.

The development provides accommodation that is well insulated, affordable and secure for local people, as well as bringing young families to our village with its elderly demographic.

The project has been more than ten years in the making. The inordinate delay was down principally to funding problems, but also planning and minor logistical difficulties.

The scheme was promoted by the parish council. It was brought forward under the council's exception site policy which provides a way of bringing forward much-needed affordable accommodation for local people in rural areas like ours. It gives landowners a fair, but not outrageous return.

The development has not been plain sailing. The principal problem was that the developer built two-bedroom homes, as identified in the needs survey. But when it came to allocation, single people were told by Home Choice that they did not qualify for the two-bed accommodation. It was quite a battle to secure the house for the one local resident now occupying. Planning was also a nightmare - though this is a problem which affects development of all kinds.

The parish council was very much involved in the design of the scheme and was keen that it should be in keeping with the local vernacular. Much as I welcome the style, I'm not sure about the juxtaposition of the pink and yellow on the façade of the terrace.

Suffolk village increases affordable housing by over 30%

The completion of six brand new affordable homes was officially marked by the community of Middleton in Suffolk on Friday 21 October 2022.

Prior to the houses being built, there was a total of 19 affordable homes in the area of Middleton. These six new homes represent a 31.57% increase in social housing provision making a huge difference to local people and life in the village.

Once a green field site, the development includes three 2-bedroom houses for social rent, as well as one 2-bedroom house and two 2-bedroom bungalows for shared ownership. All homes have been prioritised for people with a local connection to Middleton, such as those working in the village, those with close family in the area, or those who previously lived there but were forced to move out because of a lack of affordable housing.

The homes have been designed in a local traditional style with a mix of materials to fit with the character of the village. They've also been built to a high energy-efficient standard to help reduce fuel bills for residents.

With the support of the local Rural Housing Enabler to identify a suitable site, works began on site in December 2020 and were completed in February 2022. The homes were developed in partnership with Middleton Parish Council, East Suffolk Council, Suffolk Council, architects Parsons + Whittley, building contractor Marfleet and Blyth, and employer's agent Potter Raper.

Hastoe invested £958,000 into the development with an additional £330,000 from Homes England.

The village voted on a number of names for the new cul-de-sac and Roke Drive was the clear favourite. Roke is an old East Anglian term for an early morning and late evening mist. The mist runs down the field where the houses are built at certain times of the year.

All partners, as well as local councillors, attended the official completion of works including residents who had moved in this year. The occasion was commemorated with the cutting of a ribbon.

Resident Jennifer Merredew said: "Living in this new house has made a really big difference to my life. I was living in an old cottage in Middleton. I now enjoy having space and light, and I'm really happy to still be in the village I love. There's room to entertain friends in the kitchen/diner which is an added bonus and a noticeable lack of drafts, which I am particularly aware of coming from a chilly cottage."



Financial Roadshows are being held in local towns offering advice and signposting residents to available help. The District Council has appointed a new Chief Executive Officer, Chris Bailey, to replace Stephen Baker who retires at the end of the year. Cllr. Rainger concluded his report by mentioning the National Grid Sea Link and Euro Link public consultations. The District Council is holding joint meetings later this month to hear the views of Town and Parish Councils.
- **4. Minutes** The Council approved as accurate the minutes of the extraordinary meeting held on 4th October 2022 and the meeting held on 11th October 2022.
- **5. Matters Arising** With reference to item 8, Cllr. Lesley Taylor reported that she spoke with IP17 Good Neighbours Scheme about the Warm Rooms initiative. There are a number of guidelines to be eligible for Warm Rooms funding, which Middleton could not meet, but residents may use facilities in Saxmundham and Leiston.

6. Public Forum Resumed

- a) County Cllr. Richard Smith said he attended the official opening event at Roke Drive hosted by Hastoe Housing. Cllr. Smith commended the Parish Council for seeing the project through and said the houses were well designed. With regard to Sizewell C, Cllr. Smith said that TASC's initial Judicial Review request was turned down however they submitted further documentation refuting many of the Secretary of State and EDF submissions, that criticised the Judicial Review request, and they await the decision on the request for an oral hearing in front of a different judge. There was a rumour in the press that Sizewell C was under review by the government but this was swiftly denied. The cost has now risen to £25 billion but Cllr. Smith opined that it cannot now be built for less than £40 billion.
- b) A member of the public asked the Council to consider providing adult exercise equipment at the playing field. She said there was lots of play equipment for children but no provision for older residents, who outnumber children in the parish, and that dog walkers could use the equipment while their dogs run around. She offered to research details of equipment and costs for installation and maintenance and suggested grants could be raised to fund the project. She has a number of letters of support from residents which she passed to the Council. The Chairman replied that the Council has discussed this idea previously and agreed to consider it as part of a mix of future strategic objectives for the parish. The strategic objectives will be decided after the election in May 2023 when the Council could have a different membership. The Chairman said there are other provisions on offer for adult residents in the parish including yoga and pilates classes.

7. Casual Vacancies

The Chairman proposed that the Council co-opt Charles Macdowell to fill one of the Council's casual vacancies. Mr Macdowell said a few words about his particular interest in Sizewell C and his desire to assist as there will be a lot to do if the development goes ahead. The Council unanimously approved Mr Macdowell's co-option to the Council. Mr Macdowell signed the Declaration of Acceptance form and joined the Council with immediate effect.

ACTION: Clerk to inform the District Council.

8. Energy Projects

The Chairman reported on the first meeting of the Sizewell C B1122 Early Years Working Group. The focus is on the early years phase when most of the construction traffic will use the B1122 to reach the construction site and to build the associated infrastructure. The purpose of the group is to explore ways to mitigate the impact of the traffic, particularly safety, noise and vibration. The group comprises EDF, Middleton and Theberton Parish Councils, the District Council, EDF's consultants WSP, and SCC Highways. The group reviewed plans for foothpaths along the B1122 but only within the constraints of the Highways' boundary and there was no provision for protected cycling. Four unprotected crossing areas are being offered denoted by tactile paving where there are good sight lines. Village gateway signs and granite setts in the road were suggested for the approaches to the Moor to inform drivers they are approaching a settlement.

The previously proposed suggestion from EDF to prohibit right turns from Mill Street has been abandoned. The provision of an illuminated sign on the B1122 to inform drivers that a vehicle is waiting to emerge from Mill Street is also being considered. Cllr. Roy Dowding said the Mill Street junction will be dangerous as there will be few gaps in the traffic and drivers will take chances. He suggested that levelling the rise to the right of the junction should be reconsidered. Cllr. Lesley Taylor said the proposals offer very little as the footpaths do not join up, there is no protection for the properties fronting the B1122, and the gateways are cosmetic and not effective. Cllr. Taylor said the request for quiet surface dressing on the B1122 has been turned down as it is not considered necessary for a 30 mph speed zone. The Council requested a 20 mph speed limit through the Moor and for ANPR cameras to monitor speeding. The Chairman said that Highways' reply was that a 20 mph limit was not enforceable. EDF will be monitoring the speed of HGVS which may set the speed limit within 30 mph. Cllr. Steve Thorpe said the stretch of B1125 between Reckford Bridge and the junction with B1122 has been added to the group and he also requested a 20 mph speed limit from Reckford Bridge to Yew Tree Corner and ANPR cameras. The Council agreed that the next steps were:

- (i) to convene a meeting with representatives from Theberton, Walberswick, Westleton, Kelsale, Yoxford and Blythburgh Parish Councils to discuss how intervention in one parish may affect neighbouring parishes and to ensure joined up views are presented to EDF;
- (ii) to invite residents to a surgery in the Village Hall in the new year to hear their views about EDFs proposed plans;
- (iii) to conduct site visits to the B1122 to identify stretches where the proposed footpaths could be joined.

ACTION: Clerk to arrange joint meeting and check availability of Village Hall for joint meeting and surgery. Councillors to conduct site visits to B1122.

- b) The Chairman briefed the Council about the National Grid Sea Link and Euro Link consultation. The nearest potential sites for convertor stations are east of Moat Road at Theberton and at Saxmundham near the boundary with Sternfield. The convertor stations will connect with the substation proposed for Friston. The preferred landfall site is between Aldeburgh and Thorpeness and the cable swathes will cross the RSPB North Warren. The Council accepted the Chairman's offer to draft a response to the consultation.
- **9. Planning** The Council agreed there was no objection to planning application DC/22/4038/FUL construction of a two-bay single-storey cart lodge and log store. In another position, the construction of a hay and small tractor store, moving along the existing, open metal store Rose Farm Barn, Mill Street.

ACTION: Clerk to inform District Council.

10. Consultations The Chairman completed the Transport East – Rural Mobility Survey but following a discussion with Council a number of amendments were identified.

ACTION: Clerk to ask if the submission can be amended.

11. Councillors' and Clerk's Reports a) Highways – Cllr. Lesley Taylor raised a concern about school parents' parking on Rectory Road as there was an incident where the mobile library bus came into contact with a badly parked vehicle on the corner.

ACTION: Clerk to write to school and investigate possibility of double yellow lines for the corner.

b) Drop-In Centre – Cllr. Lesley Taylor informed the Council that the Drop-In Centre may be eligible for funding from an ESC Cost of Living Grant. It was agreed to apply for £1,000. Cllr. Taylor said the Community Council was not providing a Christmas lunch this year. Cllr. Chris Reynolds said this was due to the ongoing risks of COVID. The Council decided to arrange for a smaller Christmas lunch event at the Drop-in Centre on 15th December.

ACTION: Cllr. Lesley Taylor to apply for a grant.

- c) Village Greens the Chairman said he spoke to the Parochial Church Council about improving the disabled access to the Church but unfortunately they do not have any funding to support this initiative.
- 12. Finance
- a) The Council noted the latest financial position, including receipts, and verified last month's approved payments.
- b) The Council authorised the following payment:

Parish Council Report November 2022 - Sizewell C

Please come and discuss EDF's plans for the B1122 - Village Hall Jan 7th and 14th 10am -12noon

Sizewell C has planning consent and continues to be supported by the UK government. But it still needs to overcome a legal challenge and attract investor support before it is a done deal.

The Parish Council hopes it will be abandoned but meanwhile we are engaging with EDF on what they might offer to mitigate the effects of the construction traffic along the B1122 in the 'early years' before the Sizewell Link Road comes into operation.

We have been shown plans prepared for EDF and met with them and the County Council in the 'B1122 Working Group'. The remit of this group has also been extended to cover the B1125.

So far, the conversation has included speed limits (30mph from Yoxford to Leiston), 'unprotected' road crossings, signage and small stretches of footpath where this can be accommodated within the highway boundary.

We think it is important that our residents have an opportunity to comment on the plans we have been shown and we are therefore planning to hold two 'surgeries' in the Village Hall from 10am to 12 noon on January 7th and 14th, when the plans will be on display and members of the Parish Council will be present to explain them and listen to your views.
