










WI News

At our May meeting we welcomed Richard Allenby-Pratt, a professional photographer, to give us a talk on his work called "The Suffolk Project". Richard grew up in the west of England, was in the forces and then became a commercial photographer. He was based in Dubai for 16 years. While there he started to take personal pictures of man's effect on the environment in the UAE: photos of the oil fields. container shipping, quarries, aggregate waste covering vast areas, half-built tower blocks. They are stark landscapes devoid of human life, just a single wild animal inserted for effect. But he also took an interest in the wildflowers that bloomed in the desert after a rain. This interest in the environment stayed with him when in 2014 he, his wife and son moved back to Suffolk where she was from. After all that time in the desert, the change of seasons was striking which led Richard to taking many photos of wildflowers and grasses. The "Suffolk Project" was born: a series of photos capturing all aspects of Suffolk life including agriculture, conservation, the character of Suffolk and childhood.

Agriculture: the farming photos showed all aspects of farming from intensive one crop big machinery to diverse mixed crop small machinery to specialist wheat production for thatching using old threshing machines and scythes. We loved the photo of "Achilles", the Suffolk Punch workhorse, and his handler. Achilles has sired 70 foals at the Suffolk Punch Trust.

Conservation: the pictures were of the marshes at Darsham, Carlton, Snape, wildflower meadows, coppicing the woods, Konick wild ponies and cattle grazing the grasslands. He mentioned the work of the Suffolk Wildlife Trust and Wild East.

Character of Suffolk: photos of landscapes that probably have not changed in generations, old farms, barns, pigs and sheep. As Richard wandered, he took photos of people going about their business on farms, in shops, in trades of all kinds. Some had been here for many generations and others had just recently decided to call Suffolk home.

Childhood: Richard had loved his rural upbringing and was anxious for his son to have the same experience. He and his 9-year-old went for many long walks through the countryside. He showed photos of his son encountering insects, toads, butterflies, small mammals and other natural treasures that can delight a child, even stopping to take in the view.

All in all, Richard showed us over 200 beautiful photographs which were enhanced by his running commentary on the why and where of each one. We thanked him for his very interesting presentation. Our next meeting will be Wednesday June 21st at 7:15pm. Sylvia Hawes will be talking about her Guide Dog. Everyone is welcome.

June Nature Notes

The sight of a hobby is always exciting whether hunting low over the fields or a swift-like silhouette high overhead. The hobby is a fast and agile summer visitor - (not arriving in Britain until well into May), recognisable in flight by its long, swept back wings, square tipped tail and rapid hunting tactics. Its interesting scientific name *Falco subbutteo* is nothing to do with table football but simply means falcon smaller than a buzzard. (The name of the table football game Subbuteo relates to the games creator Peter Adolph, who was an ornithologist, not been granted a trademark to call the game hobby).

From a distance the hobby looks completely dark, although the white throat is always evident. On closer inspection the hobby has a dark eye ring and moustache stretching below the beak and a white throat leading down to bold dark streaks on the breast, the back is dark grey and the thighs are a rusty-red colour. The presence of these red 'trousers' is the easiest way to distinguish the hobby from other falcons such as the similarly-sized kestrel and the much larger peregrine although this feature is missing on the juveniles. Sexes are similar but juveniles are generally much browner, and do not have the red thighs and vent of adults.



Hobbies are opportunistic feeders with a wide variety of insects and around 96 species of bird documented as prey items. They have the ability to catch birds in the air either by chasing them or in a diving stoop from height; Swallows and martins are its most common prey, but the hobby is one of the very few birds of prey capable of outflying and catching swifts; perhaps at a speed approaching 100mph. Although, when catching dragonflies at the height of summer their flight is more relaxed, with short accelerations and turns. The prey is then consumed on the wing during a short glide. Large eyes allow the hobby to be very active at dusk when it is highly successful at hunting bats and insects in the twilight, well after sunset or ambushing swallows as they come in roost.

Hobbies nest in mature woodland, hedgerow trees, and copses; they choose disused crow and sparrowhawk nests or squirrel dreys as like other falcon species, they do not build their own nest. Breeding occurs well into the year from late May to August and this allows the adults to feed chicks on an abundance of dragonflies and fledgling birds. They first breeds at two years, laying 2-3 eggs in a single brood; After the young hobbies leave the nest, their parents continue feeding them but within a few days they will hunt slow-flying beetles before turning their attention to such rapidly moving prey as dragonflies. Only much later, following prolonged aerial games, do they try hunting birds or bats. The hobby population has grown significantly in recent decades. It's thought this could be linked to an increase in flooded gravel pits and reservoirs having led to a rise in dragonfly numbers. It has also been suggested that the species may be benefitting from the UK's warming climate.

MIDDLETON CUM FORDLEY PARISH COUNCIL

Report of the Parish Council for the year ended 31st March 2023

Sizewell C

The potential impact of the Sizewell C (SZC) project on the Parish has continued to take up much of our time in Parish Council meetings. The Development Consent Order (DCO) was approved by the Secretary of State on July 20, 2022, but funding for the project has not yet been secured and no final decision to proceed has yet been taken by EDF or the UK Government.

The Parish Council remains opposed to SZC but has taken part in meetings of the B1122 Working Group established under the DCO. This Group's purpose is to consider what can be done to provide relief from the impacts of construction traffic through Middleton Moor and Theberton in the 'early years' of the project before the proposed Sizewell Link Road is operational. We are also working with neighboring Parish Councils to work out how best to respond.

Planning

The Parish Council is consulted on all planning applications for land and buildings in the Parish. Middleton cum Fordley is classified as a 'Small Village' in the Suffolk Coastal Local Plan which means that new housing will normally be restricted to 'Small groups of new housing and infill within Settlement Boundaries'. The Parish Council ensures that all planning applications are considered at a duly convened meeting held in public and has normally been supportive of proposals to improve the existing housing stock.

County Broadband

Some residents have registered for the proposed full-fibre broadband service to be installed by County Broadband. We have reports of letters having been received by some residents referring to wayleave agreements. The company has confirmed that at this stage they are only looking for confirmation that they have the correct landownership details and that this implies no further obligation to allow any works or enter into a wayleave agreement. If that is required they will get back in touch with more information.

Finances

The Parish Council receives income mainly from Council Tax, the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) and other occasional grants. CIL is levied on all new housing developments and can only be used for improvements to local infrastructure.

During the year we also continued to receive support from East Suffolk Council to continue the operation of the Drop-in-Centre at the Village Hall.

At the end of March 2023, the Parish Council had general reserves of approximately £6,800. This is approximately 80% of the annual Council Tax received by the Council, which is at the high end of our financial planning guidelines. This gives us scope to consider environmental or infrastructure projects (subject to our limited powers) within the Parish and the Council would welcome proposals from residents.

Recreation Ground Trust

Successive generations of residents have always taken care of and valued the 'playing field' which is owned by the Recreation Ground Trust and operated by the Parish Council. The orchard planted by Middleton WI has continued to thrive. Use of the facilities for community events and private parties continues to grow. Regrettably, the wooden supports for the zip wire have reached the end of their safe life and this facility is currently closed pending a decision on its future.

Elections

There were only six nominations for the nine Parish Council places which means that all six were elected unopposed on May 4, 2023. The Council has the power to co-opt residents to fill the vacancies and would welcome applicants.

Parish Clerk

Our Clerk, Sharon Smith, resigned during the year to pursue her career elsewhere and her expertise and diligence will be missed.

Annual Report 2022/23 for Middleton Village Hall

All regular activities have resumed without restrictions, a welcome return to normality.

Pilates sessions have increased with the addition of more one to one sessions and monthly Bone Density classes.

The Heritage Quilters have booked for most of the year and indoor bowls have played league, cup and practice matches.

Thursday coffee mornings have continued and also provided a Christmas lunch for regular attendees. Thanks to Lesley and Lynda for their much appreciated efforts. Six new chairs with arms have been purchased to provide safer and more comfortable seating and a new portable screen has been acquired to support talks and lectures.

The main hall has been professionally redecorated. There has been community use of the broadband facility.

New floors have been laid in all three toilet areas providing a more hygienic and more easily maintained surface. Thanks to our Secretary Trish Cooke for organizing visits and quotes. The fire alarm system has been upgraded to comply with current regulations.

Giant thistles were sprayed successfully but will need further attention this Spring. The area behind the disabled parking bays has been weeded and cleared by a working party under the capable supervision of Steve and Mandy from Manor House. Rope netting has been laid to stabilize the soil and a selection of suitable plants have been planted which, once established, should help to bind the sandy soil.

Three projects have been planned for next year which include the replacement of the flat roof on the kitchen and Committee Room section of the hall which has been repaired several times but has lasted since the 1980's, the renovation of the main hall floor to return it to its former glory and centenary preparations are in hand to celebrate the hall's 100th birthday.

Thanks go to our regular cleaner, Kevin Whitmore, who has helped us to maintain high standards of cleanliness.

Many thanks go to all members of the Village Hall Management Group for their continuing support and advice..

Annual Report of Middleton-Cum-Fordley Community Council 2022/23

It has been a very positive year with more community involvement in every event we have organised, along with monies contributed to chosen causes. We have had a mixture of larger fundraising events, such as the Summer Fete and Autumn Fayre and many community engagement activities, organised for the well-being of the village and residents.

The Midsummer Quiz was, once again, held on the playing field and was hosted by Quiz Master Peter Vincent. The evening was very enjoyable.

We provided the opportunity for different community groups to attend a First Aid training day at the Village Hall. DAC Education presented the course and those who attended left feeling confident of their up to date training and shared three improvements we could all make to our lives. – Know your what3words locations to help emergency services, register to use text for 999 emergencies, know how important time is when needing to use an AED. This led to requesting a second AED for the Village. A Community First Aid Kit was advised and purchased for trained First -Aider's when at events.

The July boules competition was attended by so many, the car park was used as an extra pitch. Jenny and Richard Turner were awarded the first prize.

Also in July, we celebrated the late Queen's Jubilee at the playing field with music from the last seven decades, photos of past Jubilee celebrations and a picnic, complimented by sparkling drinks and a lovely cake.

The Summer Fete took place on the playing field with easy access for all our equipment, great facilities in the Pavilion and ample parking space. The fete had a wide selection of food and drink on offer, many village stalls and games staffed by volunteers from the village. Silmor entertained us with live music and the Dog show arena was a constant hubbub of activity. The event was a great success and raised nearly £2,000.

The Autumn Fayre was held in October at The Bell. The Random Blues Band entertained everyone from the barn and there were marquees to give cover if required. All sorts of fun activities were available, mainly tailored to the young-at-heart, creative and food orientated. It was very well attended and raised over £700.

Remembrance Sunday saw a wreath laid on behalf of the Community Council by the Reynolds family.

Santa Boules in early December was a busy affair, with plenty of festive competition. Jenny Turner and Graham Cooke took first place.

A Christmas Celebration for the whole village was held on the Village Green and at The Bell. It began with the switching on of the new LED lights on the green at 4:30pm, followed by a procession back to the Bell to be entertained by Wrentham Brass Band. Everyone dressed warmly and enjoyed the nibbles, singing and raffle. This year the proceeds of the raffle were split between local Shelter and Leiston Food Bank.

Our celebration picnic for the coronation of King Charles III was very well attended, the sun shone, we chatted, and residents enjoyed a marvellous cake whilst listening to Piccadilly Swing.

The Community Council have bought another two heavy-weight gazebos which we also loan out to other village organisations and events. We purchased another large circular bench for the playing field and provided online Food Hygiene training for members.

The £100 Young Person's Bursary was awarded to Amy Heather towards the purchase of a bigger lens for her camera and every child/young person under 18, resident in the village, received a £10 voucher for Christmas.

Report for Annual Parish Meeting 2023 - Middleton Newsletter

10 years ago when I took over the editing we were still producing each issue on the school photocopier and a team of volunteers collated and stapled it together. Thank goodness we have moved on and now have each issue printed by Leiston Press. We do still have some of the original band of volunteer deliverers along with some new ones who all do a great job in delivering the Fisherman to all properties and the newsletter to some on each street. Thank you, team, and thank you to the regular contributors who send in articles and reports.

As it has since its inception in 1984 the newsletter relies on donations for its finances, from private individuals, village organisations and advertising by residents. Printing costs vary according to the number of pages in each edition and how many copies are ordered. Currently approximately half of residents like a hard copy and half are happy to receive it as an email attachment. (It currently is not possible to send everyone an email version). It is also published on the village website.

The accounts for 2022 (published in the February 2023 edition) showed a loss of £672 which ate into the reserves. There have been ongoing discussions about whether to make it compulsory to make a donation for hard copy, whether to make it solely an email version (not a practical option) or perhaps to revert to black and white printing again which would be cheaper. All of these are not really steps I, as editor, would wish to take at this moment in time until it became absolutely necessary.

- a) The Council approved as an accurate record the minutes of the meeting on 11th April 2023.
- b) Matters arising.
 - (i) Cllr Macdowell confirmed that Planning Permission has been approved for the work at Valley Farm discussed at the last meeting (and in respect of which Cllr Macdowell declared his interest as the applicant).
 - (ii) County Broadband cabinet. Cllr Cusack has objected, on behalf of the Parish Council, to the placement of the cabinet (on the Moor). The application states that the land is owned by East Suffolk Council (it is in fact common land) and it was agreed that the Council should have consulted with the Parish Council regarding the location, since it is the Parish Council which is charged with management of the Moor. The Openreach cabinet is better located. Cllr Thorpe mentioned a letter received by residents from County Broadband, concerning rights across properties; Cllr Cusack advised that the letter was to establish land ownership and that he had communicated to the Company that the letter was confusing.

District Councillors Tom Daly and Katie Graham were welcomed to the meeting and, in turn, thanked everyone for their participation in the recent election and invited the Parish to raise any issues with them. Cllr Daly advised that a representative will regularly attend the Parish meetings thus allowing the opportunity to address any issues. Cllr Daly also advised of three specific areas of support: assistance for anyone wanting to start a business or have started one in the past 12 months, a digital springboard to advertise company presence and support for low carbon emissions.

7 Councillors

a) Councillor's responsibilities agreed as follows:

Cllr Lacey - Village Hall Management Committee

Action: Clerk to advise Richard Turner that Cllr Lacey will be representing the Parish Council

Cllr Reynolds - Middleton Primary School

Cllr Thorpe – Summer Wine Group Cllr Taylor – Middleton Moor Management Group

- b) Cllr Cusack and Clerk Finance
 Cllr Reynolds Recreation Ground
 Cllr Macdowell Energy Projects
 Cllr Thorpe Highways, Footpaths and Trees
- c) The model Code of Conduct 2020 which has been distributed with the Agenda was adopted.
- d) It was noted that there are three vacancies on the Parish Council. Cllr Cusack confirmed that we can operate with six Councillors but ideally we would have more. It was confirmed that anyone who lives in the Parish is eligible to be co-opted. It was also highlighted that aside from Cllr Cusack there is no Councillor from within the village centre. Cllr Macdowell offered to draft an advertisement for the Newsletter to try and drum up some interest.

8 Sizewell C

Cllr Cusack reminded the Council that the B1122 Working Group has had two meetings and plans have been produced by the highways engineers showing some improvements to footpaths and road signage. One meeting with adjacent parishes has been held. In terms of traffic impact, Kelsale is concerned with rat running, Walberswick is concerned with speeding and Yoxford is concerned about increased traffic through the High Street. A letter has been drafted regarding these and other concerns and requesting an enforcement of speed limits (funded by EDF).

Action: Cllr Macdowell to organise the next meeting within the parishes.

Each parish will feed into the process individually, as well as collectively.

It was noted that traffic is already diverted from the A12, due to accidents, incidents and/or roadworks, the impact of which will only worsen with the increase in HGVs, and the personal vehicles of Sizewell workers. There is also the issue of sharp corners on the country roads coupled with the Government's latest approval for longer HGVs. Cllr Cusack asked Cllr Macdowell that this concern be added to the above-mentioned letter.

9 Finance

- a) The Annual Accounts for 2022/2023 were approved.
- b) The Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR) was approved including the Annual Governance Statement, the Accounting Statements and the Certificate of Exemption
- c) It was agreed to set the period for exercise of public rights from 5 June 2023 to 14 July 2023
- d) The Community Infrastructure Levy Statement 22/23 was approved.
- e) The Internal Audit Report 22/23 was discussed and approved.

Cllr Cusack advised that outgoing Clerk Smith has set up online banking that requires only one user/signature. The responsibility has been temporarily passed to Cllr Cusack to control the accounts until such a time that it is passed onto Rachel Salcombe, as Responsible Financial Officer.

In line with the Internal Audit recommendation, it was recommended that bank statements are circulated to the Councillors each month to demonstrate clearly that all payments made have been duly approved by the Council. All payments, as detailed in the Agenda, have been agreed plus £84.52 to Cllr Taylor for the Drop-in Centre and £140.80 as an advance to the Clerk for wages due for April. It was agreed that the Council should engage SALC to operate its payroll function at a cost of £8 per month plus an annual charge of £38. It was further agreed that the Council would purchase a mobile phone for the use of the Clerk at a cost of £134.

11 Correspondence

a) LionLink (previously EuroLink)

National Grid are requesting access to private land within the Parish to carry out ecological investigations in the form of non-invasive surveys. Cllr Macdowell reported that National Grid have agreed to share the results of their surveys with the landowners.

Cllr Daly meeting with Graham Stuart (minister) tomorrow (Wednesday 17th May) to discuss how most affected communities can be helped. Cllr Daly will push for the offshore option and Cllr Cusack asked that Cllr Daly reflects the views of the Parish in opposition to cable corridors through our area.

Cllrs Daly and Graham were thanked for their input and left the meeting.

b) Replacement Bench

> Cllr Cusack advised the Council of an email received from Trish Cooke regarding a broken bench on the village green. She has enquired as to whether the Parish will provide a plaque (In memory of Alec Robert Smith) for fixing to the new bench.

Action: Cllrs Reynolds and Thorpe to investigate.

Cllr Lacey shared photographs of a large tree that is leaning over Fordley Road. There is concern that once the tree goes into full leaf, coupled with possible high winds, it will come down. Cllr Cusack advised Cllr Lacey to log the concern on the County Council's Highways Reporting Portal. Cllr Lacey also enquired whether funds were available for additional signage on Fordley Road to read Unsuitable for HGVs. It was agreed that the Parish would write to the local authority.

Action: Cllr Cusack/Clerk to request new signage for Fordley Road.

Cllr Macdowell reported that several signs have fallen within the Parish. Cllr Cusack advised that he take photos and upload onto the Highways portal.

Action: Cllr Macdowell to take photos of fallen signs. Cllr Thorpe to enter onto portal. Cllr Thorpe to circulate Highways link to the Councillors.

Cllr Macdowell enquired whether the Councillors would like to set up a process for permissive paths. Cllr Cusack indicated that he was in favour of committing funds (irrespective of whether Sizewell C goes ahead).

Action: Cllr Cusack to open a discussion with local landowners.
